

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- #60 <u>Manuelita Trujillo</u> <u>House</u>, ill. 57; 60' W of U.S. Highway 84 and 200 yards S of Los Brazos River.
 - 4. <u>Owner</u>: Manuelita U. Trujillo Estate, c/o Bernice Trujillo, Box OO, Los Ojos

7. Description: foundation unknown; stucco over 20" adobe walls; intersecting new corrugated metal gable roofs; 2/2, 4/4 double hung windows with board surrounds; three single doors to front; chamfered porch posts. Front-facing L-shaped plan, porch along entire front.

Located among mostly later or greatly modified houses and mobile homes along the current and historic main highway through the valley, at the edge of the first plateau where it falls gradually to the Los Brazos River on the north.

8. <u>Significance</u>: This is a little-modified, good example of the local folk building tradition at the turn of the century. The L-shaped composition of rooms as discrete units, each with its own door (and probably built in phases) and the use of adobe come from the Hispanic roots of the tradition. The orientation towards the street, gabled roof and chamfered porch post are Anglo-American introductions. The wrap-around front porch, too, is an Anglo introduction, but used in Hispanic fashion for exterior circulation.

10. Acreage: under 1. UTM Ref: 13 360030 4067640

Boundary: A rectangle, roughly 50' by 70', formed by lines parallel to and ten feet from the outermost walls or porches.
