This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.


Louise H. Burnett says that the land belonged to Rynier F. Wortendyke a d that he left it to his son Jacob, who was already living there, in 1/98. Jacob, who was a man of means, married Elizabeth Campbell on December 2, 1792. We assume that he built the house around this time. He died on December 18, 1858 and the farm went to his only son, Rynear J., who had married Cornelia Haring on January 10, 1818. Their son, Hon. Jacob R. moved to Jersey City and had four children, to whom the house was left following Rynear's death (after 1876). They sold it January 26, 1892 to David H. Tice, who established "Tice's Farm".
