Summary

The Damascus Gymnasium is a Craftsman-style, single-story structure with a two-story clerestory constructed in 1933 by the WPA. A metal, gable-on-hip roof with single-story shed roofs at the eastern and western elevations covers the weatherboard-clad frame walls. The entire structure is supported by a continuous cast-concrete foundation. The gymnasium features Craftsman exposed rafters and ornamental brackets, two interior brick chimneys, and a central, projecting gable roof porch.

Elaboration

A central, projecting gable roof porch signifies the eastern or front elevation. The porch is composed of a raised concrete deck and two wood posts, which support the flush, horizontal board pediment. The deck is accessed by five concrete steps, and entry is gained by two single-leaf wood doors. The eastern elevation is fenestrated by six, symmetrically arranged stationary windows that are placed just below the eaves. The clerestory consists of seven identical windows that are likewise symmetrical.

The southern elevation contains two raised, single-leaf door entrances, both of which are covered by metal shed roofs supported by brackets. The western shed roof bay is accessed by a modern folding overhead door. The clerestory is lighted by three symmetrical one-over-one, double-hung doors. Two brackets support each shed roof at its intersection with the clerestory.

The western elevation is composed of two six-over-six, double-hung windows near each corner and two raised, single-leaf door entrances placed between the two groups of windows. The clerestory is fenestrated by four stationary windows. The northern elevation is identical to the southern elevation except the eastern shed-roof covered entrance is missing.

The building is currently unoccupied.

Damascus Gymnasium

The Damascus School District in southern Van Buren County was established in 1910, and in 1926 the Damascus High School consolidated with the nearby community of Southside to establish the Southside Consolidated System. Following the recommendations of the 1928 Department of Education study, Van Buren County "caught the spirit" of school consolidation in the early 1930's. New teacher certification standards were established for the county's districts required college training for the first time, and graduation standards were raised for the district's students. Despite vociferous opposition from a few county superintendents, during the early years of the decade all districts with fewer than 350 pupils were consolidated, and the number of school districts in Van Buren County fell from 92 to 40.

Damascus was suffering economically in 1933, a result of both the national depression and the local re-routing of Highway 65 that year that bypassed the community's original downtown. The establishment of a CCC camp to the east of town later that year helped to resuscitate the local economy somewhat; the town's population is reported to have "doubled in just a few days" as families moved to the area to work in the camp or establish new businesses. Local citizens donated money to ensure that the Damascus High School remained open during these trying times, and in 1933 the Works Progress Administration provided funding to construct a gymnasium adjacent to the school to accommodate the school's popular basketball team.¹

The Damascus Gymnasium, constructed during the period covered by the historic context The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a large wood frame school building constructed for a rural school district. Its documented construction by the W.P.A. and its use during this period as a local school building clearly identify it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with both the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period and the W.P.A.
