The Upper Madison School is a wood frame, gable ended school house with ship lap siding. An enclosed entry vestibule has been added to the east wall (date of the addition is unknown) and there is a band of windows on one side of the building only. Located to the west of the building are two outdoor privies. A new concrete foundation has since been added, but does not detract from the integrity of the building. in a significant way. 20a Reason for significance: Mistorical Associations Marchitectural and Engineering design and appearance Presence of historic or prehistoric information 20b Please justify the historical significance; noting important persons, events and/or historical patterns associated with structure, site and surrounding area. The Upper Madison School is another gable ended, frame type of school house (E). Like the Pass Creek and Lower Bridger Schools, this building is characterized by the addition of the enclosed entry vestibule and window band side lighting. This evolved form marks the typical Gallatin County rural school form preferred during the 1920's and 30's.
