The rustic covered bridge spanning the North Fork of the Yachats cost the county just \$1500 when built in 1938, and today, is one of the shortest covered spans in the state. This wooden bridge is the last covered span constructed by veteran bridge builder, Otis Hamer. Located just seven miles from the salt water of the Pacific Ocean, this trim little bridge is one of the few to escape the "graffiti-artists" so common in many of the other covered bridges. Warnings nailed on the ends of the bridge tell of a long-forgotten regulation, "No Cleated Tractors".

Although this cueenpost design appears in excellent condition, the county has put a load limit for its passengers at 8 tons. Most of the siding has been replaced in recent years, and the structure appears able to enjoy many more years of service. As with other county spans, hand-split pilings support the bridge.

The nearby community was established in 1880 as Ocean View, and was later changed to Yachats in 1916 in honor of a local tribe of Indians. The name "Yachats," according to the Indians means, "At the foot of the mountain," an appropriate nomenclature for both the bridge and community.

To get there: From Yachats, go east on Yachats River Road approximately seven miles. After crossing a cement bridge, turn left, and travel about 2 miles on this road to the bridge site.

rnysical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This bridge, built in 1938 for \$1,500, is the newest covered bridge in Lincoln County. It is made with Queenpost Truss construction and is 42 feet long. It has a board and batten exterior, flared at the base, and a shingled, gable roof. The bridge is open to traffic. This bridge is located near the end of a **dead end road** on the North Fork of the Yachats River. The location is at the base of a hillside. The bridge is shaded by a dense growth of trees on the hill and the nearby riverbank.
