Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The E. B. Mallett Office Building of Freeport, Maine, is a restrained and dignified example of the later Italianate style in a commercial context. Designed by one of Maine's most prominent late 19th-century architects, Francis H. Fassett, the building was constructed in 1888.

The two-story building is of brick construction, with steeply-pitched hipped roof, a single offset internal brick chimney, and granite trim and foundation. Fenestration throughout is 2/2.

The facade, which faces south-west, is three bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance, covered by a simple frame hood with gabled roof, contains a double doorway.

Windows in the facade and in the two-bay-wide sides of the building are capped by low brick arches with granite keystones and terminals, along with granite sills. Above the facade entrance is a granite panel containing the raised date 1888.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Perhaps more than any other man, Edmund Buxton Mallett, Jr. (1853-1923) shaped the appearance and character of the Town of Freeport. Upon inheriting a large fortune from his uncle in 1883, Mallett moved to Freeport from Pownal and launched his industrial empire. Between 1884 and 1892, Mallett constructed and put into operation two shoe factories, a saw mill, a grist mill, a coal yard, a brick yard, a lumber yard, a granite quarry and the Freeport water system.

This sudden activity changed Freeport from an agricultural crossroads, with shipbuilding activity along its shoreline, to a commercial and industrial center. The influx of workers created a demand for housing, met in large part by Mallett as he constructed tenaments and single family "cottages" in the Queen Anne style.

Portland architect Francis H. Fassett, architect of this building, is thought to have designed Mallett's shoe factories, many of the houses he had built, and, perhaps, other buildings. In the construction of this structure, the granite was obtained from Mallett's quarry, the brick from his yard, and the lumber from his mill.
