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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Grahame House is located near Lower Marlboro, Calvert County, Maryland. The house is approximately onefifth of a mile north of Maryland Route 262, one-fourth mile northeast of the junction of Route 262 and Maryland Route 523.

This is an eighteenth-century original one-and-one-halfstory brick shell with a steeply pitched "A" roof. The house, over a high basement, is five bays long and three bays deep constructed of brick laid in Flemish bond with all the headers glazed. All the windows have segmental arches consisting of two rows of header brick. The window sills are molded brick as is the water table cap. The two windows high in the basement have segmental arches and have vertical iron grille bars built into the brickwork. The central entrance door has a transom. A chimney is built into each The three peaked dormers on the roof appear gable-end wall. to be recent at this time (1970). The one-and-a-half-story, two-bay-wide addition to the right of the house with exterior walls of beaded clapboard and a single peaked dormer appears of early construction.

The alterations have included the purchase and removal of the fine paneling throughout the house to the Henry Francis duPont Winterthur Museum, Delaware, and the absence of the original entrance door and window frames.

The present (1971) owners have installed modern sashes and have filled the old openings with brick. They are attempting to reconstruct the interior paneling.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The late eighteenth-century owner of the Grahame House, Charles Grahame, was associated with Frederick Calvert, sixth Lord Baltimore, through Grahame's brother and with Thomas Johnson, first elected Governor of the State of Maryland, through Grahame's son. Grahame's brother, David Grahame, married Charlotte Hyde, cousin of the sixth Lord Baltimore. She became a widow in 1754 and Baltimore appointed Charles Grahame to two lucrative patronage jobs--Naval Officer of the Pocomoke and Surveyor General of the Eastern Shore--so that he could support his sister-in-law. Baltimore acting through Governor Horatio Sharpe replaced Grahame a year later when Charlotte Hyde Grahame remarried.

Charles Grahame's son, John Colin Grahame, married Ann Jennings Johnson the daughter of Thomas Johnson, first elected Governor of the State of Maryland, which strengthened the association between the two men. They served together in the Lower House of the Maryland General Assembly. Rose Hill, north of Frederick, was a wedding present from Governor Johnson to his daughter and son-in-law. After settling at Rose Hill and establishing himself in Frederick County, John Grahame sold his father's Calvert County holdings.

Charles Grahame's political career which included helping to draft Maryland's first constitution (1776) and the province's protest to the Stamp Act (1765), as well as his election to the first session of the Maryland Senate (1777), brought Grahame into contact with the leaders of Maryland politics including two Signers of the Declaration of Independence: Samuel Chase and William Paca.

Sometime after 1755 Grahame purchased several tracts of land near Lower Marlboro in Calvert County from Christian Smith who, by a previous marriage, was the mother of Thomas Sim Lee, the second elected Governor of Maryland (1779-1782/VEU) and 1792-1794). Grahame may have built the Grahame House $25n_{1972}$ the 1750's or he may have used a house already on the NATIONS on the same tract as the present (1971) building.
