

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Built in 1906, the Hudson House, 817 Gold Street SW, is an excellent example of the Period Revival style. It is located in a residential area southwest of downtown Albuquerque which is composed primarily of small bungalows and mid-20th century apartment houses. The house is three stories topped by an imposing gambrel roof and contrasts dramatically with its smaller and newer neighbors. It is frame construction, sheathed in grey-painted wood shingles. The front facade features a shallow projecting bay under its own "tower" roof and a two-tier porch. Exterior woodwork and most of the windows and doors are original. Leaded glass decorates the door toplight and the upper sash of the two front windows. is rectangular, broken only by the bay at the southwest and the porch across the front. The porch posts are reminiscent of Territorial style posts: squared with a simple base and capital. Between the posts on both tiers is a wood railing with its balusters arranged in a series of "X's". The original stable/carriage house stands unaltered at the rear of the property. A 1940 two-story addition on the east does not detract from the house; with its low hip roof, identical siding to that used on the house, wood windows and similar roof overhang treatment, it blends well with the original building.

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Description

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Windows throughout the house are 1/1 wood sash in simple mitered wood frames. On the front facade are two large single-hung windows with the upper sash of leaded lights in an elongated diamond shape. There were two paneled-wood front doors on the porch, one a 1941 addition when the house was converted into apartments (this was just removed by the present owners). The original entrance door is flanked by single light sidelights with a three-part delicately tinted stained glass top light. A corbelled brick chimney is centrally placed on the roof ridge. A six-foot-deep stone foundation underlies the house.

On the east side of 817 Gold is a two-story addition designed by local architect Tom Danahy in 1940. The siding is identical to that on the original house; the roof is a low nip. The addition's distinctive feature is the wood shutters flanking each 1/1 wood sash window, a decorative touch characteristic of the architect's work. On the rear, hidden completely from the street, is another two-story addition enclosing the stairway to the top floor and creating a screened back porch on the second floor as well as utility rooms on the first. A small narrow pitched roof dormer denotes the upper end of the stairway. Some of the windows on the addition are metal casements.

At the rear of the property is a frame gambrel-roofed building; it is contemporary with the house and was probably used as a stable and carriage house. Its roof is steeper than that on the main house and its walls are clapboard. As on the main house, there are gable returns at the base of each gable. Three large sliding plank doors, two constructed in a herringbone pattern, cover the front facade. On the rear is the hay loading door set in a pitched-roof dormer; the boom is still in place and the hay hook is stored in the stable. On the interior the hay loft is intact.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hudson House at 817 Gold SW, is one of only two houses remaining of the many grand houses built in the residential district immediately southwest of downtown Albuquerque. It is a fine example of Period Revival architecture and features some outstanding detailing such as the leaded upper sash on the front windows, the delicate stained glass windows above the front entry and the two tier front porch with its striking balustrade. The stable/carriage house at the rear is the only one left in the downtown area. The builders and original owners were Clarence and Rose Hudson, important figures in the early 20th century local business community. Mr. Hudson originated the poster advertising business in Albuquerque.

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Significance

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The Hudsons had the house built in 1906 and owned it until 1936. Clarence Hudson was born in 1864 in Tennessee, the son of Englishman Alexander Hudson who contracted to build many early railroad lines. When he was 16 Clarence Hudson ran away from home and came to Albuquerque where his first employer taught him the painter's trade and then, when he moved to California, left Hudson his business. In 1885 Mr. Hudson began selling poster advertisements, the first in the city. The Hudson Poster Company was run by him until his death in 1920 and then by his wife until 1927 when the business was taken over by the Llewellyn Company. It was subsequently bought out by Markham in 1961 and it in turn was recently absorbed by the Donrey Company, the most prominent outdoor advertising firm in the city.

Mrs. Hudson, born Rose Renner in Wurttenberg, Germany, came to this country with her parents. She married Clarence Hudson at Cerrillos, New Mexico in 1894. According to her biography she was an accomplished businesswoman; friends and neighbors remember that she also was a prolific artist and the house was filled with her paintings.

When Mrs. Hudson died in 1936 the house was left to her sister, Mrs. Edith Fillmore, wife of B.F. Fillmore, a nephew of President Millard Fillmore. Mr. Fillmore had served as vice-president of the Hudson Sign Company. The Fillmores converted the house to apartments in 1941, adding an east wing and a rear addition. The east addition was designed by Tom Danahy, a prominent local architect who designed many of the large impressive homes in the nearby Huning Castle Addition. In 1951 the house was bought by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Forsythe who sold it to a law firm, Leonard DeLayo and Associates in 1981. The firm is removing the apartment partitions and will use the building as its offices. The exterior will remain the same except for the removal of a door on the front added in the 1941 remodeling. They plan to renovate the carriage house at the rear.
