Description:

The Joseph Killgore House is a two-story frame building probably constructed in the second quarter of the 19th century. It is located on the west side of North James Street, north of Justis Street, and faces east. The house is set back from the sidewalk a short distance, and surrounded by a small lawn. Killgore Hall (N-11006), a late 19th century commercial building which was developed by the resident of the house, is located on the adjacent property to the south.

The Killgore House stands three bays wide with a central entrance. Large six-over-six windows flank the door, which is sheltered by a small gabled porch. Three smaller two-over-two windows are ranged across the upper story. The facade is capped with a simple boxed cornice. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A brick interior chimney exits from the peak of the north gable, and features a pair of decorative terra cotta chimney pots. A smaller chimney, with a single chimney pot, rises from inside the south wall about halfway down the rear slope of the roof. The exterior is covered with asbestos shingles; the original cladding material is undetermined. The interior was unavailable for examination.

Exterior architectural evidence suggests that the house began as a 1½ story, hall-parlor plan building, and achieved its current two-story height in an expansion later in the 19th century. The extended rear slope of its gable roof results in a "saltbox" configuration, uncommon in the vernacular architecture of the region.

Statement of Significance:

The Joseph Killgore House is significant for its architecture, exemplifying the hall-parlor plan type which characterized the majority of middle class housing in the lower Delaware Valley (and the Delmarva peninsula generally) during the 18th century and well into the 19th. 1 Although this plan type was once common in the region, surviving examples are increasingly rare; this is especially true of frame specimens. The Killgore House is further distinguished by its "saltbox" configuration, probably achieved in one or more 19th-century expansions, resulting in a form which is uncommon in the vernacular architecture of the region. house is among the earliest surviving dwellings in Newport.

In the mid-19th century, the Joseph Killgore family operated a small shop located next door to this house on the south, at the corner of Justis and James streets. The Killgores were gardeners and beekeepers, and also had an orchard on the opposite side of James Street, including the parcel where the Bank is now located. They sold produce at the market in Wilmington. The son, John W. R. Killgore, remained at home with his parents; in 1883, John W. R. Killgore demolished the shop on the corner lot and replaced it with the three-story brick building known as Killgore Hall (N-11006).
