Prior to 1732, David A. Ackerman and his wife Margrietje Turchs settled on this land of 200 acres of the New Paramus Patent (and probably built the wing of the house now gone - CKT). They had seven children before he died in 1760. Son Garret D. Ackerman, a weaver, married Elena Van Voorhis about 1740 and inherited the homestead. They had ten children and he died in the winter of 1773-74. David G. Ackerman (born May 8, 1744) inherited the house and about 100 acres and married about 1775-76 Altjie Terhune with whom he had six children. He died July 8, 1831 and his son Abraham D. Ackerman inherited the house and 65 acres. He married Rachel Doremus about 1818-19 and they had five children. They sold the homestead on September 7, 1855 to Garret G. Banta with seven acres. It went through several owners until bought by David B. Naugle on May 7, 1861 who owned a hotel just to the south. He died on February 1, 1882 and his son John D. Naugle bought it and held it until his death on May 3, 1921. Heirs sold it to Louise E. Tatosian. John B. Woodward owned it for more than thirty years and it is now in the hands of his daughter and her husband.
