DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The original M. Theo. Kearney Park was begun in 1892 when Kearney commenced the planting of the 240 acres he called Chateau Fresno Park. He had already planted the 140-foot wide Kearney Avenue from Fresno Street to the entrance of his home grounds. This 11-mile stretch of road was planted in alternating eucalyptus and fan palm with 18,000 white and pink oleanders. In laying out the Chateau Fresno Park, Kearney was assisted by Rudolph Ulrich, a landscape gardener of no little renown. To avoid a view down a long flat road, all his roads were planned on graceful curves so that the view constantly changed as one drove along. To create the illusion of gently sloping hillsides, Kearney planted low shrubs first, then taller one, then trees of gradually increasing heights, culminating with dignified eucalyptus in the background.

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The Kearney Mansion today has been refurbished faithfully to its original condition with either quite necessary, or expedient, modifications. Work has been done on the foundation to make it stronger to support the three-story structure as today's stringent building codes were not in effect at the time the house was built. Also, M. Theo. Kearney originally willed his estate to the University of California for an agricultural extension and, not appreciating possible historical significance, the University subsequently removed many of the furnishings. When it was learned that the Fresno County Historical Society wanted to restore the Mansion, most of the original artifacts were returned and those that were not were replaced with turn-of-the-Century originals.

The Mansion, as mentioned, was three-stories tall and built of adobe brick with a stucco finish on the outside and plaster paneling in the inside. The ground floor consists of six restored rooms among which are M. Theo, Kearney's office and study which now stand as they did at the time of his death in 1906. The second floor is mainly the sleeping quarters with four bedrooms and two baths. Mr. Kearney's own bedroom on this floor has been faithfully restored and the other three are furnished in the style popular in the late 19th Century. The third floor is an attic which was Kearney's studio and storeroom. This floor is not open to public tour as the adobe foundation is not reliable enough to afford this luxury. Mr. Kearney used the Mansion, which was intended as a house for his superintendent, to live in while he was planning a more extensive dwell+ ing a short distance away. The new house was to be modeled after Chateau Chenoncaux in France and was to be called "Chateau Fresno".-

The M. Theo. Kearney Park and Mansion should be accorded historical landmark status to memorialize and acknowledge the impact of this man on the Central Valley. His contributions in the field of agriculture have had significant impact upon Fresno County's present predominance as an agra-business center. Mr. Kearney's contributions enabled the small farmer to get his start through the innovations he introduced in irrigation and land parceling. Additionally, Mr. Kearney saw to the organization of the Valley's first raisin growers association and his scientific methods were, for the most part, adopted as standard operating procedures. Accordingly, M. Theo. Kearney's ornate lodge and symmetrically beautiful grounds would stand as a monument to his influence in the early development of Fresno County. The Mansion and Park are the only markers remaining, in a state of repair, that can testify to this great man's contribution to Fresno County in general and agra-business specifically.

# 6. <u>Tarpey Depot</u> (continued)

g. Additional information: History of building: This structure is not part of the Kearney complex. Tarpey Depot was built circa 1893, on the M.F. Tarpey estate south of Clovis and northeast of Fresno; it served as a depot for the San Joaquin Valley Railroad billed by its promoter Marcus Pollasky as the beginning of a trans-continental railroad. After the railroad project was hurriedly abandoned by Pollasky, Southern Pacific acquired the line and operated the depot as its Pollasky branch. A local real estate firm eventually acquired the structure for use as offices. In 1966 it was given to the Fresno City and County Historical Society and moved to its present location.

  - a. Date of construction: before 1958
  - b. Architectural style: rectangular building of wood-frame construction with exterior plaster.
