7. DESCRIPTION

The Pepperell Center Historic District, located in Pepperell, Massachusetts, consists of 118 contributing buildings, structures, objects, and sites that collectively make up the central residential and institutional crossroads of this town. Pepperell is located at the New Hampshire border in north-central Massachusetts, approximately 45 miles northwest of Boston and 20 miles northeast of Worcester.

The 154-acre district radiates from the Town Common, the intersection of Park Street from the north, Elm Street from the south, Main Street from the east, Townsend from the west, and Heald Street from the northwest. The district is bordered by open agricultural land and undeveloped wooded areas on the north, south, and west. On the east the district is bordered by the industrial village of East Pepperell. The district is situated on a hill above this industrial valley to the east with hilly terrain to the west.

The district boundaries follow property lines at each edge and border areas of greater open space and/or newer construction. Visually, the boundaries are natural ends to the nineteenth century village that radiates from the hill site of the Old Meeting House (no longer extant). Nearly all the buildings included in the district are for residential use with the exception of the Town Hall, the Evangelical Congregational Church, Pepperell Academy (known as Grange Hall), the Lawrence Library, and Hutchinson Store/House (now the church parish hall). There are three noncontributing properties with a nonresidential use. The former schools have been converted to residential use. There are 96 lots with 161 buildings, three sites (two cemeteries and the Common), four objects (the flagpole, Bunker Hill Memorial, War Memorial, and the cemetery fence), and two structures (the Pound and a silo).

The topography conveys a clear picture of the town's historical development, with the high land of the Town Center well above the industrial setting of East Pepperell, which borders the Nashua River. The higher areas have well-drained soils for farming, the main economic base of this small village surrounding the institutional buildings at its core. House lots are spacious with mature trees and consistent setbacks. Remnants of a couple of fruit tree orchards are found on the north end of Park Street, and agricultural fields are located on the south end of Elm Street near the district boundaries. The Walton and Corporation Cemeteries at the core of the district on the hill contribute a rural, parklike setting from which the district derives much of its ambience.

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Buildings in the district are domestic in scale with the exception of the three substantial institutional buildings—the church, the town hall and the library. The context of the district is residential with all but the institutional buildings ranging from 1 1/2 - 2 1/2—stories in height. Most are well preserved, displaying wood clapboard siding; two properties are shingle clad. There are eight masonry buildings, three of which were built in the 1950s retaining a similar scale but of noncontributing status due to the date of construction. Only eight properties have been covered with synthetic siding, of which only three are contributing properties.

Most buildings date from the late Federal to the late Industrial periods of development, with the Federal and Greek Revival styles as the predominant architectural styles. Only a few examples of early twentieth century architecture are extant. Most buildings are vernacular interpretations of the popular styles of each period, and approximately twenty of the residential properties have attached barns representative of the traditional evolution of New England farmhouses. Most of these were not originally attached: the later addition of rear and side ells and sheds have formed one unit.

Noncontributing resources that are modern in construction but retain a sense of the domestic scale and design of the bulk of the contributing buildings include approximately twenty modest residences and seventeen garages and sheds known to have been constructed after 1910. Three commercial and one institutional (the Fire Department) properties are of compatible scale and design to the well-maintained Pepperell Center Historic District.

Descriptions of the contributing properties of the Pepperell Center Historic District follow and are presented in chronological order to convey the evolution of the district from the earliest extant dwelling, the rear ell of the Nathan Shipley House built in ca. 1749, to the latest contributing building, the 1904 Waldo Spaulding House.

Residential Buildings

The oldest residential structure is incorporated into a larger Georgian house and is named after the late eighteenth-century owners. The Nathan Shipley House (ca. 1749/ca. 1780s, Map #A-12) at 10 Main Street has the ca. 1749 one-story ell presumed to have been the modest house of early settler Joseph Emerson, which was dramatically increased in size with the five-bay, 2 1/2-story, center-chimney-plan addition of the late 1700s.

One other eighteenth-century house in the district is the Reverend James Howe House (1780, Map #A-19) at 39 Park Street. It is also a five-bay, 2 1/2-story Federal-style dwelling with 12/12 window sash, an enclosed entrance portico with half sidelights, and attached sheds/ells.

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One of the most intriguing properties is the prominently displayed, Federal-style Squire Lemuel Parker House (ca. 1770, Map #A-69) at 4 Townsend Street, known locally as the Harvey Tileston House. The five-bay house was raised to form the raised brick foundation level. The raised first-story has an iron balustraded main facade and a Federal door with blind fan and large 6/6 sash.

Representative of the next period of development are several late Federal-style houses, of which at least two have notable fanlights over the center entrance. At 6-8 Park Street is the Joseph Breck Homestead (ca. 1817, Map #A-35), which displays the traditional fivebay, center-hall plan with a hipped roof. The beautifully articulated tracery fanlight over the panelled door is delicate in design and has extraordinary small brass or gilt sunburst at the bottom and tiny accents in the same material throughout the design. The door is framed by wide pilasters carrying a wide entablature and projecting This same delicate fanlight design without the gilt decorative detail is found on the James Lewis Estate (1819, #A-70) at 1-3 Elm Street. Note the similar date of construction and the possibility of the same designer. This Federal-style house has wonderful massing and detail with the noted fanlight, the hipped roof with two tall rear chimneys forming the center hall plan, 6/6 sash, bold pilasters, and entablature with the noted fanlight similar to the Joseph Breck House. This property has one of the few detached barns, an excellent example of a ca. 1850 Greek Revival outbuilding located near the rear of the property.

A good example of the transition between Federal and Greek Revival architecture is 14 Townsend Street (ca. 1824, Map #A-67), which has brick ends and wood clapboard five-bay facade with a beautifully articulated louvered fan over the front door with flanking tracery half-side lights and tapered wide pilasters carrying a wide entablature.

Greek Revival houses with gable-front, sidehall-entry plans and attached barns are numerous throughout the district. At the northern edge of the district is a fine example, 43-45 Park Street (ca. 1835, Map #A-20). This dwelling displays a three-bay gable-front facade with full returns and long front windows. The related Greek Revival barn is large and is attached by rear sheds, which were probably later additions. On Main Street are the Deacon Blood House (21 Main, 1834, Map #A-5) and the Hannah Lawrence House (23 Main, ca. 1842, Map #A-5). Both dwellings display the sidehall, gable-front plan with fully developed templar gable fronts. The Deacon Blood House also has a triangular louvered fan in the gable peak. The Greek Revival house at 16 Heald Street (ca. 1860, Map #A-45) has a recessed sidehall entrance, usually indicative of the slightly later construction date. The three-bay house also has corner pilasters with caps, which carry

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the full templar gable front. This property also has a gable-front barn, which is attached via the rear ell.

The district includes several good examples of the Italianate style, beginning with the <u>Samuel Shattuck House</u> at 3-9 Main Street (1849, Map #A-2), which has projecting one-story bays and heavy brackets, and the <u>John Loring House</u> (ca. 1850, Map #A-32) of similar plan and stylistic detail. Also at 26 Park Street is the <u>Charles Miller House</u> (ca. 1870, Map #A-28), which has projecting bays and bracketed porch with an ornate balustrade of flat pierced and punched balusters.

The district's only example of Gothic Revival architecture is the George and Alice Shattuck House (ca. 1880, Map #A-80) at 28 Main Street. The construction date is late for the Carpenter Gothic detail of decorative vergeboards and other trim found on the gable-front dwelling. Only a few examples of the Stick Style are found in the Pepperell Center District, the most prominent of which is the Dr. Samuel Fletcher House (ca. 1875, Map #A-9) at 20 Main Street. The three bay house with projecting center gable has the structure articulated with the flat wood horizontal and vertical boards.

The architecture of several houses make reference to the Queen Anne style with added porches with turned balusters, such as 8-10 Elm Street (ca. 1870, Map #A-79) and the Denham House (ca. 1885, Map #A-8) at 26 Main Street. Only a few houses display the Queen Anne style fully such as the Adelbert Boynton House (1886, Map #A-18) at 37 Park Street. The square tower with sunburst design and decorative ripple shingles as well as the wrap around porch are the prominent features.

Several late nineteenth and early twentieth century houses in the district display the Colonial Revival style. The best example is the Woodward House (1896, Map #A-29) at 24 Park Street. The large, hipped-roof, three-bay, center-hall dwelling has wide entablatures over the doors and windows with decorative Adamesque swags applied to the flat, wide frieze and a well-defined Colonial Revival entrance porch supported by paired Composite Columns. The Parker Kemp House (ca. 1860/ca. 1900, Map #A-82), situated at 37 Main Street, was rebuilt at the turn of the century with Colonial Revival updating with an entrance porch with second-story balustrade and projecting, centered, second-story bay over the porch.

Institutional Properties

The six contributing institutional buildings in the district represent the architecture popular at the time of construction. The <u>District School No. 1</u> is located behind 6 Main Street at 1-3 Park Street adjacent to the first cemetery. It is a brick, one-room schoolhouse with 9/9 sash and granite lintels. <u>Pepperell Academy</u> (1834, Map #A-33) at 12 Park Street is a Greek Revival gable-front building with

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corner pilasters and caps carrying the templar gable and having Greek Key and Rosette designs on the entablature and a Colonial Revival porch supported by four round columns. The wood clapboard <u>Center Primary and Grammar Schoolhouse</u> (1891, Map #A-64), which has modest Colonial Revival form, has been converted to a two-family house.

The <u>Evangelical Congregational Church</u> (1860, Map #A-47), today known as the Community Church, faces the Common at 1 Townsend Street, where it is the focal point of the district. It is built in the traditional meetinghouse form with the gable front and center projecting, enclosed narthex with tower of three stages, including a square base, octagonal tower with roundheaded louvers, and a tall attenuated spire. The siding of the church is wide, slightly beveled boards laid up to resemble stone.

The Pepperell Town Hall (1874, Map #A-1) at the corner of Main and Elm Street, 1 Main Street, displays Italianate design with some small Carpenter Gothic details, such as the window crowns with small pointed arch and drip molding. The corner pilasters are wide with beaded boards and have decorated bases and carry a bracketed cornice. The cupola with bell top and wide, open sides has some Eastlake design.

Of interesting detail and unique to this district is the <u>Charles S.</u>
<u>Lawrence Library</u> (1897, Map #A-4) at 15 Main Street. The Renaissance
Revival building with a Beaux Arts projecting three-bay entrance porch
is constructed of brick and granite and has a unique copper roof with
delicate iron fretwork on top.

Commercial Properties

Although several properties had cottage industries attached to them at some point in their evolution, there are only two properties built with the express intent of a commercial use as well as residential. Mentioned before is the <u>Squire Lemuel Parker House</u> and Store at 4 Townsend Street. When first built, the long building was high above the road and only included the top clapboard section of the present structure. Here Parker maintained the town center store and the post office from the late 1700s.

Built on the site of an earlier store is the <u>Hutchinson Store</u> (1901, Map #48), which also had two second-story apartments. The building, located at 3 Townsend Street, is of brick construction and has large multi-light storefront windows in the gable end facing east. The gable facade also has a centered double door entrance with multi-light transom and an iron balcony above.

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Other Resources

The <u>Pepperell Common</u> (Map #A-802) is important for its context including location and history and the remnants of the 1836 Unitarian Church foundation. The same is true of the two cemeteries, the <u>Walton Cemetery</u> (1746, Map #A-800) and the <u>Corporation Cemetery</u> (1901, Map #A-801), which have parklike settings with roadways lined with trees and decorative fencing. The <u>Pepperell Pound</u> (Map #A-903) is located on Heald Street at the district boundary. Today, it is a small enclosed area with well-built stone wall defining the ancient animal stockade.

An important object with significant historical background is located on the Common at the top of the hill. The Bunker Hill Monument (1899, Map #A-900), a semi-circular bench, was erected to remember those Pepperell men who died at the Battle of Bunker Hill during the American Revolution. Also of contributing status is the Liberty Flagpole (1910, Map #A-901) at the center of the Common.

Archaeological Description

While no prehistoric sites are currently recorded in the district, it is possible that sites are present. Two sites are recorded in the general area (within one mile) both bordering the Nashua River. The physical characteristics of the district, several well drained terrace areas with level to moderate slopes bordering Varnum Brook, Greens Brook and other unnamed seasonal brooks and wetlands indicate favorable locational criteria for Native settlement and subsistence activities. The entire area is also in close proximity to the Nashua River, a major tributary stream of the Merrimack River. Given the above information, the size of the district (154 acres), and known site densities elsewhere in the Nashua/Merrimack River drainage, it is probable that sites are present. A high potential exists for the recovery of significant prehistoric survivals.

A high potential also exists for significant historic archaeological remains within the district. Structural remains may survive for Pepperell's first meetinghouse built in 1745 at the intersection of Park and Main Streets on the Common. The foundation remains of the second meetinghouse or Unitarian Church which burned in 1917 can also be seen in the same area at the northwest corner of the common. Structure remains from three 18th Century taverns may also survive at sites opposite the Meetinghouse, at the location of the present Community Church and on the opposite side of Herald Street at 4 Park Street.

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Pepperell's earliest extant structure is the rear ell of the ca. 1749 Nathan Shipley House at 10 Main Street, however, structural remains from earlier residential structures through the 19th century could exist along any of the five streets, Main, Park, Herald, Townsend and Elm which radiate out from the original 1745 meetinghouse site. Structural remains of residences could also include attached cottage industries common throughout the 19th century. Only two structures were built in the district with exclusively commercial intent. Squire Lemuel Parker House at 4 Townsend Street operated as the town center store and Post Office in the late 1700s and Hutchinson's Store was built on the site of an earlier store. Cottage industries focusing on shoe manufacture began in the 1830s in small shops known as "Ten footers". Other cottage industries included the Lawrence Sisters dress making shop (ca. 1840) at 18 Park Street, the Luthur Boynton cobbler shop (ca. 1890) at 7 Townsend Road, and William Bradley's coach driving establishment (ca. 1890) at 18 Townsend Road. Occupational related features (trash pits, privies, wells) likely survive with domestic and commercial archaeological sites and structures still extant.

8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Pepperell Center Historic District is a well-preserved integration of resources at an important crossroads. The district is the core of Pepperell's civic center and retains examples from each period of development, presenting a continuum of the evolution of a community's institutional and residential resources. The district has properties ranging from Second Period/Georgian farmhouses and sites associated with the earliest permanent settlement of an area through the nineteenth-century periods of growth and development, and continuing to the mid- to late- twentieth century infill growth of the crossroads area. The intrusions are few and are consistent in scale and style with contributing resources. The district remains a civic and institutional center with the church, town hall, and library, as well as the cemeteries and Town Common. The Pepperell Center Historic District retains integrity of location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association and fulfills Criteria A and C and is significant at the local level.

Incorporated as a Town in 1775, Pepperell began as a settlement of Groton as early as the 1720s and was recognized as West Groton Parish in 1742. By 1753 it became the District of Pepperell with articulated boundaries similar to those of the 1775 Town of Pepperell described in the petition to form the new community.

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The economy of Pepperell was based on subsistence farming including agriculture, grazing, and in the western part of town, extensive fruit orchards. East Pepperell along the Nashua and Nissitissit Rivers was the location of early industrial sites, with the first gristmill by 1730 and a sawmill about 1750. Several other mills were established near the water source, and in 1818 a paper mill was erected on Mill Street. The 1820s was the beginning of shoe shops in Pepperell.

With the advent of the Worcester and Nashua Railroad in 1848, the mill industries flourished, particularly the shoe factories that were developed and expanded by Albert Leighton and his sons in 1868, 1879, and 1890.

The location of the first meetinghouse was pivotal in the development of the Town Center. Following the separation as the West Groton Parish in 1742, residents debated about the location of the meetinghouse. An Act of the Massachusetts General Court was necessary to settle this debate, with the compromise location being the high point between the two factions, the site of the present district. Thus the first meetinghouse was erected on the Town Common in 1745, replaced in 1769, and destroyed by fire in 1917.

The town's first ministers received land grants at the town center when coming to West Groton, soon to become Pepperell. Joseph Emerson owned land along Main Street, where he built his house, now the rear ell of the Nathan Shipley House (10 Main Street). John Bullard received land along the west side of Park Street. The Walton Cemetery was established in 1746 next to the meetinghouse and has stones from as early as 1750 as well as being the place of burial of both Emerson and Bullard.

Eighteenth-century taverns were located at the crossroads, opposite the meetinghouse, at the location of the present Community Church, and on the opposite side of Heald Street at 4 Park Street. None are extant today. Squire Lemuel Parker built his one-story clapboard house high on a hill above Townsend Road ca. 1770. Here he maintained a store and post office well into the nineteenth century. The widening of the road caused the cutting away of the hill and the construction of the brick raised basement and balustraded first story of the building at 4 Townsend Street.

The early nineteenth century brought the construction of some of the finest houses at this town center. The James Lewis House (1819, Map #A-70) at 3 Elm Street was built for one of Pepperell's lawyers and local officials. At 6 Park Street (1817, Map #A-35) is a Federal-style house built on land purchased from the Reverend Bullard by Joseph Breck, who founded the Breck Seed Company in 1818.

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The 1830s were years of growth for this civic and institutional town center. In 1832, a growing rift between Unitarians and Congregationalists led to a split and the formation of the Evangelical Congregational Society, which built its first church at the crossroads in 1832. The Unitarians used the no longer extant meetinghouse on the Common, and the Congregational Society had the new location opposite Park Street. The first church burned in 1859, and the Unitarians permitted the Congregationalists to use their meetinghouse until the existing church was constructed in 1860. This is the Evangelical Congregational Church (1860, Map #A-47), now known as the Community Church following a rejoining of the two denominations when the Unitarian Church burned in 1917.

In 1831 District School No.1 (1831, Map #A-14) was built behind the Common at 1-3 Park Street. It is an example of an early one-room schoolhouse and was later used as a fire station. (It is now a museum for the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.) Only three years later, some became disenchanted with the schools and set out to establish a private academy through subscription. Forty shares were purchased totalling \$1,000, of which \$900 was used to build Pepperell Academy (1834, Map #A-33) at 12 Park Street. In 1864 it was taken over by the town as the secondary school used such as until 1889 when a new high school was constructed outside of the district.

Although most farming was outside of the district, those living on the district boundaries were farmers. The emphasis on orchards and animal husbandry shifted to include dairy farming in the mid 1800s. The most prominent example is the Widow Shattuck's farm at 28-30 Park Street (ca. 1860, Map #A-27), which once had a huge dairy barn on this property.

Industry was contained in East Pepperell due to the transportation and power sources, the Nashua River, and the Railroad, which ran parallel to the River. However, there were a number of late nineteenth century small cottage businesses in Pepperell Center. Residents of 18 Park Street (ca. 1840, Map #A-31), the Lawrence sisters, maintained a dressmaking shop here. Also near the turn of the century, Luther Boynton had a cobbler's shop at 7 Townsend Road (ca. 1890, Map # A-50). And William Bradley's coach driving establishment was located in his barn at 18 Townsend Road (ca. 1890, Map #A-65).

Until the construction of the Town Hall in 1874, the meetinghouse on the Common served as the town meeting hall. Thus the elaborate Italianate building which is a focal point of the district was the first town hall. Its construction clearly increased the identity of this area as the institutional, cultural, and social center of the town.

The last significant phase of development of the Center was at the turn of the century, with the construction of the Lawrence Library, an event that solidified and reinforced the role of the Center as the civic and institutional heart of Pepperell. Charles Farrar Lawrence, a native of Pepperell who became a New York financeer, retained his hometown ties and had previously donated funds to build the elaborate granite and copper fence surrounding the cemeteries. Lawrence's will of 1897 set aside \$100,000 for the construction of a library and art gallery. Ernest Flagg was hired to design the building, which was constructed by W. B. Chambers. Flagg was a nationally prominent architect from New York who is best known for such buildings as the Singer Tower and the State Capitol in Seattle, Washington, as well as the Naval Academy.

Another important addition to the district in 1899 was the Bunker Hill Monument (1899, Map # A-900), a commemorative monument representative of the significant role Pepperell men played in the Battle of Bunker Hill. Colonel William Prescott, who was the commander at Bunker Hill, was from Pepperell. Prescott's house, which is extant, is on Prescott Street outside the district, and he is buried in the Walton Cemetery (1746, Map #800).

Change through loss of resources has been minimal. The most significant loss was the Second Meetinghouse, which was located on the northwest corner of the Common, prior to being destroyed by fire in 1917. As mentioned above, several taverns have been replaced, and the horse sheds that were on the Common are no longer extant. The Charles Parker House was moved out of the district in 1900 for the construction of the Lawrence Library (1900, Map # A-3). And the expansion of the cemetery in 1891 to form the Corporation Cemetery (1891, Map #A-901) led to the relocation of the J. Walton Bellows Farm (ca. 1790, Map #A-77) at 16-20 Elm Street.

Twentieth-century activity was limited to only a few new properties and general maintenance of activities and life style at the institutional center. Little or no change has been evident due to the simple roadways and main transportation routes running east of the district. Thus the identity of the institutional/civic center has remained unchanged.

Today, the Pepperell Center Historic District retains a strong sense of the institutional past with church, town hall, and cemeteries surrounding the Town Common and well-maintained residential properties lining the roads radiating from the Town Center.

Archaeological Significance

Since patterns of prehistoric occupation in Pepperell are poorly understood, any surviving sites would be significant. Prehistoric sites in this area can be important by providing data on upland/interior sites in general, particularly those sites within the interior Nashua/Merrimack River drainage. Sites in this area could also provide data on the relationship of sites in the Central Massachusetts Uplands to sites in the coastal lowland to the east and Connecticut River Valley to the west.

Historic archaeological remains described above have the potential for providing detailed information on the social, cultural and economic patterns that characterized life in a district that remained the core of Pepperell's civic center as the town developed from scattered farms and an economy based on subsistence farming in the 18th century to one which incorporated industrial manufacturing in the 19th century. Pepperell Center is well suited to trace this development since much of the early settlement and industry originated in the Center with later mid 19th century large scale industry moving to the eastern portion of town after the advent of the railroad in ca. 1848. The integrity of archaeological resources in Pepperell Center is indicated by the fact that much of the land in the district has been relatively undisturbed and relatively little new construction has occurred in the historic district over the last 50 years. Detailed analysis of structural remains and occupational related features from residential, institutional and commercial related sources can provide much needed information on many of Pepperell's wealthier and distinguished citizens who occupied much of the district. Written documentation of Pepperell's historic development is reportedly sparser than in other communities making surviving archaeological resources all the more important.

The Pepperell Center Historic District was the center for religious, social, cultural, and governmental activities as well as some educational activities during the nineteenth century. The boundaries are defined by a change in character of the geography and number of intrusions along the outer ends of Main and Townsend and by reduced density as well as change in character of properties on Elm and Park Streets.

We have recently digitized the above referenced National Register nomination (listed on 8/5/1994). In the course of digitizing, several technical errors and inconsistencies were discovered, which we would like to correct. We are writing, therefore, to request the following technical corrections be made to the nomination:

- The building at 13 Heald Street (ca. 1975) has been removed from the district datasheets because it is a nonhistoric building that was not within the boundary of the district map and was not intended as part of the district. The boundary crosses a line of convenience at the parcel (assessor's map 20, parcel 9).
- The boundary has been redrawn to include a portion of Corporation Cemetery that had been inadvertently omitted. The corrected map now follows the lot line shown on the assessor's map as parcel 16 on map 21 and includes the cemetery in its entirety.
- The boundary map has been redrawn to exclude the properties at 30 and 33 Townsend Street (map 20, parcels 59 and 41, respectively) because they were not on the district data sheet, they are outside the period of significance for the district, and they were not intended as part of the district.

These changes reduce the number of noncontributing resources to 40. Enclosed are revised cover sheets (2 pages), a revised district map, and a revised page 2 of the district data sheets (out of eight total).
