Description

East Hill House is a 3 story brick Georgian Revival mansion built in 1926 and designed by architect, Howard Van Doren Shaw. It is set just outside the main city of Riverdale, which is largely a middle class subdivision. It has a vertically symmetrical main block with a small east wing off of the main block and a large porch on the west side with a sloped, standing seam copper roof. It has a very steep hipped gable cedar shingle roof with 4 dormers on the south and 3 dormers on the north, all of which have hipped gabled copper pan roofs. The gutters are 6" copper with 6" spiraled fluted copper downspouts. There are 4 brick chimneys and 4 fireplaces (3 with marble surrounds).

The windows are primarily 6 over 9's on the first floor with concrete headers and keystones. There are numerous 3 part windows on the second floor with 6 over 6's in the middle of the group. The first floor has 6 interior pairs of french doors (4 divided light and 2 solid) and 5 pairs of exterior divided light french doors with transoms which open to a formal garden in the back and on to a west porch. The remaining doors throughout the first floor are primarily 6 panel and the doors throughout the second floor are primarily 2 panel wood doors. The hinges throughout the house are unusual with the first floor having primarily large olive knuckle hinges and the second floor having primarily rounded 3 knuckle hinges.

The ceiling moldings in the formal living areas and master bedroom are plaster with a different design in each room. The floors on the first floor are primarily black terrazzo marble and the floors on the second floor are primarily red oak wood. The servant areas are distinguished from the family areas by a lower grade of hardware (plain hinges and doorknobs) and flooring (fir and linoleum) and by plainer wood casings and mopboards. The bathrooms all have crazed wall tiles and pedestal sinks and, with the exception of the master bath, all have original porcelain and chrome fixtures. The basement has concrete block walls with numerous rooms, notably a large recreation room with wood floors, a brick fireplace and an ornate, hand-painted concrete beamed ceiling. The ceiling painting features approximately 10 different colors and is done in a classic mid-20's, art deco style. The basement also has a transomed door and a set of windows that open outside to a stone porch on the east end of the room. This room needs extensive restoration.

The house is nearly isolated, being in the midst of approximately 20 acres of woodlands. The house is surrounded by approximately 2 acres of lawn with large oaks, maples and pines all that were original to the landscape. Behind and attached to the house there is a formal garden area with a fishpond and stone walkways enclosed by a stone wall which is counted as a contributing site. These landscape features were part of the original design and are currently undergoing restoration.

The second contributing building is a 1926 carriage house which echos the main house in design and material. It is approximately 50 yards from the front of the house and is reached by a separate driveway off of the main drive. The ground level of the 2 story carriage house has 3 garage bays with hinged doors on either side and larger barn style sliding doors in the center. To the south of the house is an enclosed porch. The entire second story is a 2 bedroom apartment with bathroom, kitchen, hall and living room. There are also 2 separate basements, one under the house and one under the porch for the old boiler. When the original owners occupied the main house, their chauffeur and his family lived in the carriage house apartment. The apartment has been fully restored and is currently rented.

Just to the north of the carriage house is a contributing structure, a concrete tennis court surrounded by a fence and trees. The original owners of the property flooded the court in the wintertime for use as an ice skating rink.

The property has undergone extensive restoration due to damage caused by 35 dogs owned by the previous owner and general neglect. The dogs clawed and chewed wood trims, doors and windows and there were 4-5 inches of dog feces and urine throughout the entire house excepting the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor and one bedroom on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. Wood flooring in one 2<sup>nd</sup> floor bedroom was completely destroyed by dog urine as they were apparently kenneled there for long periods of time. The dogs completely chewed through 3 wood doors, creating large holes.

What damage the dogs did not do, they left to the raccoons. In approximately 1992, the previous owner had abandoned the main house for the carriage house and allowed raccoons to tear 2 large holes in the roof of the main house and move into the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor and attic area above the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. Consequently, rainwater poured into the master bedroom, destroying its wood flooring and

damaging the formal dining room plaster ceiling immediately below it. The raccoons also chewed and clawed all of the lower window sashes and left black footprints all over every surface of the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor.

However, the property had practically no alteration since its construction in 1926. The only change from the original floor plan was the conversion of a 2<sup>nd</sup> floor closet to a ½ bath. Subsequent changes were made by the current owners to rework the kitchen and the master bathroom, including redoing the prior ½ bath conversion. Nearly all the original woodwork, flooring, hardware, doors and windows remain. Also, more than ½ of the original light fixtures have been restored and are currently in use. The balance of the light fixtures is missing.

#### Statement of Significance

East Hill House possesses local and state significance under criterion C. East Hill and its carriage house are one of two known residential properties in the State of Iowa designed by noted architect, Howard Van Doren Shaw (1869–1926). The buildings were built for the George W. "Decker" French family and were part of the regionally famous Iowana dairy farms that raised prize Holsteins. Although the blueprints, which are dated May 1925, do not have a signature in the architect's block, two of George French's children clearly recall that Shaw was the architect and the houses typify his work from the later part of his life. Also in 1925, the French family donated the French Hall for nurses, which was designed by Shaw, to St. Luke's Hospital, Davenport, Iowa (now know as Genesis East Hospital). It was later demolished in the 1980's to make way for a parking garage Also, the descendants of the local supervising architect recalled Shaw designed the house. The French children also stated that the family named the house "East Hill House" in reference to the larger ancestral home built in 1909 on a hill to the west of East Hill that became known as "West Hill House" and the family used these names on their stationery.

Arthur H. Ebeling (1882-1965), Davenport, IA, a lifetime friend of Decker French prepared the detailed working drawings (dated May 16, 1925) and supervised the construction. His descendants had the detailed working drawings to the floor plans to East Hill House and a complete set of

blueprints to the carriage house. As there are no exterior elevations in Ebeling's set for the main house, it is assumed that Shaw provided them, but they are now apparently lost. Ebeling, son of Danish and German immigrants, was a self-taught architect through International Correspondence Schools of Scranton, PA. His career spanned 50 years (1908-1958). In the early 1910's he achieved early success with the large mansions for the Kahl and Bettendorf families, both very prominent families in the area. At about the same time he served as supervising architect of the Blackhawk Hotel, Davenport, IA and was the lead architect for the Carmelite Monastery, Bettendorf, IA. In 1919-1920 he was supervising architect for the Kahl Building, Davenport, IA. He was a founder of the Iowa Board of Architectural Examiners and held architect license no. 2 in the state. In 1939, he was architect of the Scott County Courthouse. He was a stickler for detail, and on final inspections carried a dental mirror to insure that door tops and bottoms had been coated by the painters, and a magnet to insure that the specified brass was indeed non-ferrous.

Shaw was born in Chicago on May 7, 1868. He was the son of Theodore Andrews Shaw, a dry goods merchant from Madison, Indiana of Scotch Presbyterian and Quaker decent, and Sarah Van Doren from Brooklyn, New York, of Dutch decent. Howard Van Doren Shaw attended Yale University from 1886 – 1890 and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1890 - 1892.

Immediately following graduation, he toured Europe filling notebooks with sketches and photos of architectural details. He worked as a draftsman for the firm of Jenney and Mundie in Chicago beginning in 1891 during school breaks, and after graduation until 1893. In that year, he opened his own architectural office and married Frances Wells. Shaw ran his office independently, and in his earlier years, specialized in residential construction for Chicago's prominent citizens, especially on Chicago's North Shore, and more particularly in Lake Forest where he designed more than thirty mansions.

Although Shaw designed many different types of structures in his career including commercial buildings, churches and institutions, his specialty was the country house. It was a building type that offered free rein to Shaw's eclecticism and allowed for the interpretation and synthesis of his favorite historical revivals. Colonial, Classical Revival, Tudor Revival and Shingle Style were all based on historical precedents that lent status and respectability to his clients – one of the purposes

of a country house. The architectural challenge, of which Shaw was a master, was the adaptation of historical styles to the design of American houses. Nationally known for his skill with historical motifs and detail, in 1926 Shaw became the nations' fifth architect to receive the Gold Medal of the American Institute of Architects, awarded for "distinguished service to architecture."

East Hill House is an excellent example of Shaw's work. Shaw's houses were nostalgic brick structures with high-pitched roofs. Their facades displayed a random balance of windows, doors, and chimneys. Shaw worked in a clear simple straightforward style and concentrated on the development of a well-ordered plan. East Hill House is a Colonial Revival Style and features brick walls, a steep pitched wood shingle roof, and a prominent chimney balanced by three others. The plan has highly functional living and service spaces. East Hill House features a balance of solid doors, french and single style; as well as divided light doors, both double and single. Also featured are a balanced variety of window types, in bay, casements, double hung sashes, and transoms in rectangular and divided light half-rounds. East Hill House is undoubtedly the work of a master.

#### **Boundary Justification**

The nominated property includes the parcel currently associated with East Hill House and its Carriage House and is the portion of the lot historically associated with the building on which they stand and that is owned by the current owner of the buildings. The remainder of the parcel historically associated with East Hill House is largely a wooded acreage, a highway and an industrial plant, all owned by ALCOA, Aluminum Company of America. This remaining property is not included in the nominated boundaries.
