305 North 2nd Street 1904 Dr. J. T. Tenney House

Dr. John T. Tenney came to Alma in 1901 to help with brother Dr. Jacob S. Tenney with his growing practice. In 1904 he married Rose, the daughter of Martin and Magdalina Folin and they had this late Queen Anne house with wood siding and shingled gable ends built for them. They only resided here together for less than a year when Rose died, in December of 1905. Dr. Tenney left Alma shortly after her death. Ulrich and Walser built this house for them when they finished they started on the Charles Schaettle house. The exterior features an oriel window to the north that makes a window seat on the stairway landing. The front porch extends the length of the house while the second story porch is centered between the gabled ands producing window seats in the interior. There are many stained glass, leaded and beveled glass windows including an oval stiked glass window in the bathroom. The orginal hardware remains and the interior features an ordete rail and bannister, a sliding pocket door between the living room and dining room and the formal dining room contains a clover shaped window in the entrance door from the kitchen.
