The large, two-story house built in Jacksonville for local butcher John Orth was executed of local brick in the Italianate style by George Holt, the town's leading mason. Completed in 1880, it was one of the last substantial residences erected during the final decade of Jacksonville's active growth.

A rectangular block with hipped roof and bracketed cornice, the Orth House measures 20 by 60 feet. Stove flues are contained within the brick walls. The house had no fireplaces. Stone lintels and sills frame the double-hung sash windows. A single-story yeranda with balustraded deck which once extended around the east and north sides of the house has not been standing for some years.

The main entry is located on the north end and gives access to a long side hall. Ground floor rooms are a front parlor, dining room, recessed loggia on the east side, and a kitchen. Four bedrooms occupy the second

story.

Also erected during the later period were the Orth Building (1872), the Masonic Building (1875), and the United States Hotel, which was visited by United States President Rutherford B. Hayes and his party shortly after its completion in 1880. Among other important brick buildings in the town, the Kubli Building and Redmen's Lodge (1884) are documented works of George Holt. Holt also did the masonry for the Presbyterian Church (1881) and the brick Courthouse of 1883-1884.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			WIE TO S

Following the California Gold Rush of 1849, prospectors working north through the Siskiyous discovered gold at several locations in Southern Oregon. Supplies for the mines were shipped from San Francisco up the Umpqua River to Scottsburg, at which point the goods were packed by mule team to the gold camps. Other shipments came to Crescent City on the northern California Coast and were packed north over a supply trail.

In 1852 placer mines were started at Rich Gulch on Jackson Creek in the Rogue River Valley by two California prospectors named Cluggage and Poole. At this spot Jacksonville grew and evolved as the commercial and cultural center of the region. The town became the county seat of newlyformed Jackson County in 1853 and served as such until 1927. In 1884 the Oregon and California Railroad by-passed Jacksonville, building instead through Medford to the east. Thereafter, the town's vitality declined. Having escaped development on any large scale over the intervening years, the town today retains its late 19th century character and contains more than sixty buildings of early date which are in generally unaltered condition. Among these is the large two-story brick home of John Orth.

John Orth was born in Bavaria in 1834. Emigrating at the age of 18, he settled in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he learned the butcher's trade. In 1856 he set out for Oregon via the Isthmus of Panama, and by 1857 or 1859 he was located in Jacksonville. He married Ellen Hill, daughter of an Irish immigrant who worked as a carpenter in Jacksonville for a time. Orth and his wife raised a family of seven children. He served as city councilman for several years and completed a term as county treasurer. When he died in 1896, the family butchering business was carried on by Orth's son, John Stephen Orth, who also interested himself in public affairs. The younger Orth was elected county clerk in 1902 and served on the Jacksonville board of trade.

In 1966, Jacksonville Historic District, an area unofficially described as the four blocks bounded by Oregon, Main, 4th and "C" streets, was designated a Registered National Historic Landmark. The Orth House is situated on the immediate perimeter of the four-block area, at the northwest corner of Main the 3rd streets. The landmark designation was made prior to passage of the National Historic Preservation Act and the requirement of a precise boundary description. A boundary recommendation is one of the expected results of an area study currently underway under joint sponsorship of the Historic American Buildings Survey and the Southern Oregon Historical Society.
