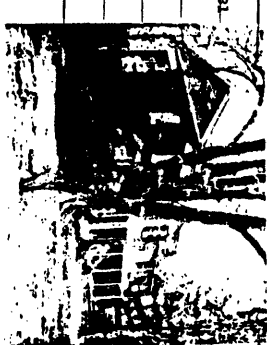

 Located on the east side of Palisado Avenue. Two story residences, many built in 18th or 19th century are visible from the site. Woodland exists to the rear descending toward the Connecticut River floodplain.

DESCRIPTION (Continued)
 2-story masonry dwelling with pitched roof, and rear 2-story ell. House is 3 bays wide by 4 bays long. The roof has paired chimneys on the south side (north side chimneys have been removed). The roof ends in a box cornice. Along the lateral eaves and across the gable-end is formed a full entablature. Penetration is symmetrical with 1st floor front and south side windows being tall, "French" type window. The windows use to open onto a handsome veranda. The entry has an elaborate Colonial Revival (1910) surround with broken pediment. The rear ell has a 2nd story frame addition over a south side porch.

SIGNIFICANCE
 This handsome masonry building is a transitional Greek Revival/Italianate style dwelling. The gable-fronted mass with complete return forms a pediment reminiscent of the Federal and Greek Revival buildings along Windsor Avenue (See 1021, 958, 891, and 860 Windsor Ave.) and 208 Broad Street. However the elaborate veranda (now gone) was Italianate inspired. This house stands today as an important element within the local historic district both because of its elegant architectural detail and its historic association with the First Society.
 It was built in 1852 as the first, church-funded, parsonage of the First Society. It was built during the ministry of Rev. Jaete, who moved here with his family in September 1852.
