DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The old U.S. Post Office building in Florence is an example of the Second Renaissance Revival style. A massive three-story building with hipped roof, the edifice features a cut sandstone basement and first level. Upper floors are of tan brick. The roof is characterized by circular "Eye of a Bull" dormers and heavy cornice brackets supporting projecting eaves.

Windows on the front (south), right (east), and left (west) facades are identical. The street level features segmentally arched windows with radiating voussoirs; the second level has 2/2 triangular pedimented windows with console-supported sills; and the third level has 1/1 windows surrounded by sandstone reveals with keystones and supported by sandstone sills with brackets.

Both the south and east facades have a portal surmounted by radiating voussoirs.

The rear facade reveals a ca. 1935 three-story addition. Constructed of similar materials as the rest of the structure, it also duplicates its scale and proportion.

INTERIOR: The first floor is divided into two main sections: a large foyer and an area that was used as work space by the postal service. These areas are separated by a wall of oak paneling with windows and mail slots incorporated into the wall. The floors of the foyer are terrazzo bordered by Italian marble; the floor tiles are joined together by bronze seams. The stairs are marble with oak banisters, while the floors of the work area are of oak. Decorative work on the first floor includes plaster consoles connected by festoons, and arches with patera motifs. Most of the light fixtures, sconces, and brass door accessories are original. Directly inside the main entrance is a large screen of pressed glass and oak.

On the second floor is the old Federal courtroom; its ceiling rising two stories. Two large oak double doors topped by triangular pediments lead into the courtroom. Outstanding features include fluted pilasters with Ionic capitals; three semicircular arched windows on the north wall, and much of the original furniture.

The remainder of the 2nd and 3rd floors are divided into offices. The basement level is also divided into many service rooms.

SURROUNDINGS: The old Post Office is located on a strategic corner in downtown Florence. At present it is vacant and for sale. The Florence Museum has expressed an interest in the structure, but, at present, funds are not available. Although in good condition, the building is beginning to show signs of neglect.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located in the center of downtown Florence, the Old United States Post Office is a significant example of the Second Renaissance Revival style of architecture. A local landmark and a focal point of the downtown area, the old Post Office served as a center of government for over seventy years. It has served as the seat for Federal Court and has contained Congressional (John L. McMillan) as well as other government offices.

On March 9, 1871 the South Carolina Legislature incorporated the town of Florence. As a railroad transfer point and a center for commercial trade, the town grew. In 1888 Florence County was formed, and Florence became the county seat. With the economic growth of the town, as well as its new responsibility as a seat of government, the physical expansion of the town was inevitable. As part of this development, the U.S. Post Office was constructed ca. 1906.

Architecturally, the U.S. Post Office building in Florence is an outstanding example of the Second Renaissance Revival style. A massive form with a wide projecting cornice and hipped roof characterizes the style. Significant features include white sandstone construction for the basement and street levels, segmentally arched windows with radiating voussoirs, triangular pedimented windows with console-supported sills on the second level, heavy cornice brackets supporting the widely projecting eaves, and a hipped roof of medium pitch accentuated by circular "Eye of a Bull" dormers.

The interior of the structure is equally well detailed, featuring English oak paneling, marble stairs, decorative plaster consoles, swags, patera and ionic pilasters, and terrazzo and oak flooring.

A major three-story addition to the rear of the building ca. 1935 duplicated the scale and proportion of the original structure along with many of the decorative architectural features.

In 1975 a new post office was constructed. The old Post Office is now vacant, and the property is for sale. Many of Florence's early structures associated with its political and commercial development are no longer standing; hence, as a symbol of the town's history, the Post Office is irreplaceable. It is hoped that an adaptive use will be found for the structure.
