DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The town of Bayhorse is situated next to Bayhorse Creek, more than 6000 feet above sea level, at the bottom of a narrow, deep canyon. In 1885, besides many dwellings, the town had three stores, one hotel, one restaurant, one meat market, one lodging house, and five saloons, with two more by 1889. Much of the original town survives in the form of log cabins, frame structures with clapboard siding and board-andbatten buildings. Some of the structures, including the old hotel, have wooden clapboard false fronts. Roofs are all steeply pitched, except for a few log buildings which utilize log purlins for strength. Most of the buildings line the single, narrow winding road and are grouped close together. There was a smelter supplied with charcoal from nine stone kilns which were fed large quantities of wood carried in by a long flume. Five or six of the kilns survive in good condition. A few people still live in Bayhorse and occasional mining activity occurs nearby.

The district commences in the center of Section 2 T12N, R18E, South 1/4 mile to the S.E. corner of the N 1/2 of the SW 1/4 of Section 2, west 1 mile to the SW corner of the N 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of Section 3, T12N, R18E, north 1/4 mile to the center of Section 3, east 1 mile to point of beginning.

One of Idaho's better preserved mining camps, Bayhorse is part of a district which produced about \$10,000,000 by 1898. Bayhorse Creek was inspected at some length in 1864 when a prospecting party came through from Stanley Basin. A claim was located there in 1872 by W. A. Norton, but work did not begin there until March 1877, when a lead-silver property was discovered. Mines nearby, close to Clayton, were found in April, and a party from Bonanza located the major producer at Bayhorse--the Ramshorn--the same spring. A mining district which included Bayhorse and Clayton (about 15 miles apart) was organized October 1, 1877. This was one of the prominent central Idaho districts in the great expansion there after 1880.

By 1880, the new town had a water propelled smelter capable of handling over 30 tons per day. From July to September, 1880, the mill machinery and a dozen houses were built, and there were 75 people in town by the middle of September. A sawmill, also water powered, was installed. In 1885, the addition of steam power aided winter production and by then the Bayhorse Smelter was producing eighty tons of bullion per month, including 450 ounces in silver. A refinery was installed in the latter part of December, 1885 so silver could be shipped out in bars. At this time, the Bayhorse Smelting and Mining Company had 200men about the works and its mines, which included the Post Boy, Utah Boy, River View, Beardsley and the Ramshorn.

Production increased until 1889. On May 14 of that year, a fire destroyed two dwellings, a stage barn, Sing Lee's wash house, and Charles Small's mess house for teamsters. Then in November 1889 within a two week period, the town was practically deserted due to Secretary Windom's ruling on Mexican silver lead ores. Over three hundred men were put out of work and work could not be resumed before the following summer. Bayhorse before this time had reached its peak population of around 400.

Today, some mining still occurs, and summer visitors are on the increase to this typical mining camp of the late 19th century. One of the great attractions is the aura of a real mining town, still complete with its original utilitarian cabins and shops left much as they were, preserving the architecture of a bygone Western era. Few ghost towns in the west compare with Bayhorse for unspoiled charm. The charcoal kilns there are about the best surviving in Idaho.
