

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):



The boundary, indicated by points A, B, C, D and E, include the church and privy and the two cemeteries, north and south of the church. The acreage, contained within the fences is sufficient to provide a setting for the church. Boundary A-B is on the west side of Lower River Road, while the boundary B-C is on the west side of a farm lane.

Beginning at a point on the west side of Lower River Road at the east property lin (B), proceed 350' south along the lane to the rear property line (C). Then proceed 130' along the fence line to the west property line (D), turning north for 500' along the property and fence line (E). Then proceed east along the fence line to the west side of Lower River Road (A), turning southeast along the road 200' to the point of origin.

45. Description and House Plan:

Traditional for the area in form, the gable-front building has a single opening in the front, none in the back, and four windows on each side. The double doors, designed in a distinctly non-Greek Revival style with chamfered members including diagonals, are lighted by a large transom, recently shattered and temporarily boarded over. The shuttered windows are topped with wooden lintels; the sills are of wood as well. The brickwork is in common bond, and the fading red paint on the bricks is possibly original. A stove flue pierdes the roof surface near the center of the north wall. The cemetery south of the church has been in use from the 1960s, while the cemetery to the north was not used until the mid-20th century. A privy behind the church was constructed after the church's period of significance.

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13. Statement of Significance: (Continued)

fifteen were not particularly from the period 1800-1930. Churches of this common form were built of brick, frame or log, in the major towns of the county, in crossroads communities and in rural settings. Many examples have been abandoned, added to or altered, yet the form is still a readily identifiable, major component of the built environment of Boone County. Approximately a third of the examples are very simple structures with little or no ornamentation. Stylistic references include Federal, Greek Revival (the predominant style), Italianate and Gothic Revival.

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
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
