REAS OF SIGNIFICANCE (Ch	eck One or More as Appropri	ato)	
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Six of the original buildings erected in Stamping Ground when the town was laid out circa 1818 were standing as late as April 3, 1974, when a series of tornadoes passed through the community. Since that date the wreckage of five of the buildings has been hauled away, leaving only the frame structure with its brick wing constructed around 1815 by original lot holder, Alexander Bradford. Architecturally the Bradford house is a good representative of early nineteenth century construction and was the finest and least disturbed of the aforementioned early Stamping Ground structures.

Alexander Bradford, for whom the house was built, was from a noted family important in the history of early western American journalism. His father, Benjamin James Bradford, a property owner in the Stamping Ground area, was responsible for establishing the first newspaper in Frankfort, Kentucky, and, in 1800, founding the Tennessee Gazette.

Of greater fame were John and Fielding Bradford, uncles of Alexander Bradford, who, in 1787, established the second newspaper west of the Alleghenies, <u>The Kentucky Gazette</u>. Published in Lexington, the <u>Gazette</u> provided the means for knitting the Commonwealth into a political entity, thereby leading to statehood. Also a factor in their importance, according to Frank Luther Mott, "was that they and printers trained by them are continually appearing in the history of frontier newspapers."

Of historical significance in his own right, Alexander Bradford was one of four commissioners appointed to lay out the town of Stamping Ground on a 162-acre farm sold to Joseph and Scott Herndon by Robert Johnson. In 1812, Bradford, formerly the first postmaster of the town, received a license to operate an "ordinary," or tavern, in his house-becoming the second citizen of the town to be so licensed.

Although the birth and death dates of Bradford have not been ascertained, it is known that his will was probated in 1832. During his lifetime, however, he was a participant in the founding of a Kentucky town and the preservation of his house would be a visible reminder for the community of Stamping Ground of their heritage.
