The A. C. Gilruth House is a one-and-one-half-story cube-shaped dwelling of ornamental concrete block masonry construction (cast stone). Situated on a tree-lined corner lot in the North End Neighborhood, Watertown, South Dakota, the small house rests on a poured concrete foundation. It is capped by a mansard roof that is covered with wood shingles. A brick chimney rises from the center of the roof. Twin gable-roof dormers are symmetrically arranged on each surface of the mansard roof. Recent poured concrete steps lead to a small wood door that provides the main entrance to the home. A gable-end hood supported by slim wood brackets covers the front entrance. A modern wood frame rear entry addition is located on the southeast corner of the house.

Fenestration on the relatively simple building is symmetrical. Windows are long rectangular double-sash units, framed by plain wooden surrounds with concrete lintels and lug sills.

A one-story clapboard garage of unknown date (non-contributing) is located to the west of the house.

Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the A. C. Gilruth House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good example of the smaller homes built in the North End Neighborhood, Watertown, South Dakota, after the turn of the century. Constructed of a popular vernacular building material, ornamental concrete block or cast stone, it is a simple one-and-one-half-story cube-shaped house. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan the property relates to the following historic context: V. Depression and Rebuilding, A. Changing Urban Patterns, 3. Residential Changes.

The first recorded deed activity on this property was a 1902 transfer for \$99 from the Winona and St. Peter Railroad Company to William I. Ross. In 1908, A. C. Gilruth purchased the property and constructed the house. There were no further recorded transfers until 1920. Gilruth, an early dry-goods merchant, reportedly lived in a substantial dwelling at 113 Fifth Street Southeast as early as 1901. Presumably, he used the simple house at 218 Second Ave., Northwest as rental property.

Shortly after the turn of the century, the use of ornamental concrete block or cast stone, as it is sometimes called, became quite widespread throughout the county. Often constructed on site from do-it-yourself molds available from such companies as Sears and Roebuck, the blocks were strong and inexpensive. The use of cast stone offered afordable single-family housing. Probably based on pattern-book designs, the Gilruth House is a small simple cube-shaped dwelling with symmetrical fenestration, popular for smaller families at the time of construction. However, it also features a mansard roof, which was not as popular as gable roofs after 1900.

The period of significance for the nominated property does not extend beyond its date of construction in 1908.
