Large extended plan house and barn complex consisting of 2-story, hipped-roof New Hampshire farmhouse reconstructed (1908) in Late Georgian style but Federal proportions, with corner pilasters, asymmetrical fenestration (6/6) and bracked cornice (motif repeated on front doorway entablature). Clapboarding is painted red with white trim. Extending to the south is a large 2-story clapboard barn with cupola connected to the house by a 1-story wing with three elliptically arched barn doors. Barn has central door in gable end facing road. Attached to barn on south is a small 1-story cottage. Farmstead parallels road and looks over it eastwards to Peterborough hills.

Handsome example of high style Georgian Revival reconstruction of 18th-century Dublin farmhouse associated with the Gowing family--prominent in 19th century farming and public affairs--and with period of early 20th-century gentleman's farms in Dublin. Although this house was built to replace a 1793 predeces-

sor which burned in 1908, it would be worthy of nomination as an early 20thcentury example of the Georgian Revival.

19. History

This house was reconstructed in 1908-09 following a fire which burned the original house and barn to the foundations. The original farmhouse was probably built c.1793 by William Gowing (1767-1854) who sold it to his younger brother Joseph (1777-1838). (Their elder brother James built the neighboring farmhouse at the Dublin Christian Academy.) Remained in Joseph Gowing's family until 1858, passing first to his son Zaman (1811-1855), thence to Zaman's widow, who married secondly Joseph Willard Powers.


Among the numerous owners in the next 30 years was Samuel Whitney Hale, later Governor of New Hampshire (1882083), who did not live here but utilized timberland for his woodenware manufacturing.

It served as the principal farmhouse from 1890-c.1919 on Boston industrialist Louis Cabot's extensive gentleman's farm-estate, and was occupied by his farm manager Edgar H. Tuttle. Following the fire, caused by lightning in May 1907, Cabot rebuilt the house.

After a decade of absentee ownership by the Hart and Craig Box Company, it was bought in 1929 by Mrs. Mabel Bremer of Boston (later wife of Episcopal Bishop J.L.D. Learned), who named it "Yonder Farm" and built a large addition to the house. The present owner (b. 1901) is a physicist and retired professor of physics at M.I.T.
