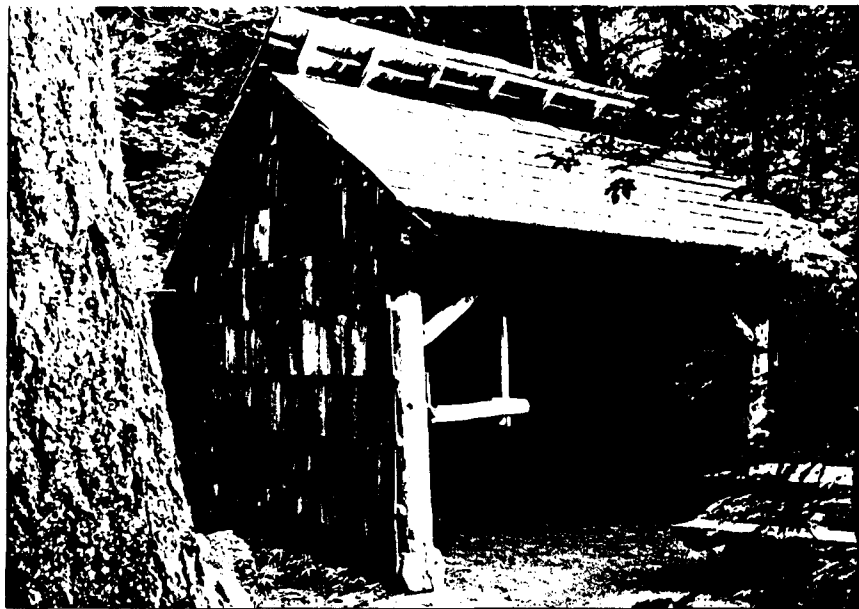

Shelter. Wood frame set on log and rock foundation; square (14' x 14'); 1-story; wood shake siding (on 3 sides) over round log construction; wood-shaked saltbox roof with slightly extended eaves and extended ridgeline; entrance opening on northeast. Exterior features include exposed log purlins and rafters.

This shelter was built in the 1930s by the USFS using CCC labor. The CCCs were stationed down lake (Chelan) at 25-Mile Camp, but had a side camp (20 men) in Stehekin for many years. This shelter had new shakes installed on the roof by a YCC crew c. 1979.

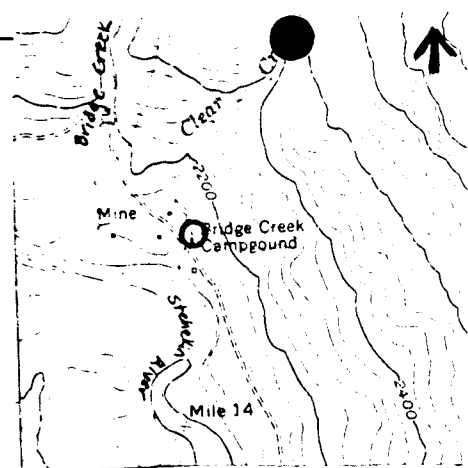

SIGNIFICANCE *Eligible under Nat. Reg. Criterion C: significant as a distinct type of building. This is a good example of a 1930s-era USFS-designed backcountry shelter. It reflects the USFS design ethic of utilizing natural/native materials and siting structures with a sensitivity to the environment. Only a few regulation(designed and built according to USFS standards)shelters stand today within the NOCA; most were removed by the USFS and the NPS because of changing needs, philosophy, and liability problems. This shelter was built by the CCC. It possesses integrity of location, design, setting, workmanship, materials, feeling, and association.*
