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SUMMARY

Son's Chapel is located at 5480 East Mission (Arkansas Highway 45 East), approximately 3 miles east of Fayetteville, Washington County, Arkansas. Constructed between 1933 and 1937, the structure is a 1 3/4 story native fieldstone, gabled structure reflecting both Gothic and Romanesque influences. The structure sits on 2.09± acres at the Son's Chapel community and, other than a crude privy, is the only structure on the property. The property is demarcated on the west, north, and east boundaries by large pine and cedar trees. An old, unused well is located on the west side of the building. Since its completion, this structure and its interior has virtually been maintained in its original state and provides a pristine example of fieldstone masonry.

ELABORATION

Son's Chapel is a two story gabled structure constructed of native fieldstone with an asphalt shingle gabled roof, built between 1933 and 1937. The rectangular structural design features the main entrance on the south elevation. An attached modified, castellated tower structure, also of the same native fieldstone, anchors the very southeast corner of the building. The south face of this tower features a Roman archway that frames the recessed gothic-style entrance doors.

Son's Chapel is located within the Son's Chapel community. The community has maintained much of its rural characteristic although it is located just outside of the Fayetteville city limits. The area has become a much desired location for families wanting to locate near the town and still have the benefits of a more rural setting. The nearest commercial areas are at the intersection of Highways 45 and 265 to the west, and the small town of Goshen approximately 4 miles to the east. Directly south and across Highway 45 is the Son's Chapel cemetery which dates to the early 1800's. Although relocated several years ago, the Son's Chapel community schoolhouse once stood on the property. A non-historic privy is located just northeast of the chapel, but is not contributing to this nomination.

South Elevation

The main façade of this building faces south and is defined by the castellated tower structure and the Romanesque arches over the main entrance and windows. A native stone walkway leads to the original front entrance, which features arched double wooden doors located on the castellated tower. Wedge-shaped native stones construct a Romanesque arch framing the doors. Two large fanlight windows are also found along the southern elevation. The larger window is composed of two 16-paned, mullioned windows. The "fan" atop the windows includes a memorial stained glass designed and created by local artisan Grace Babcock that was installed in 1990. The smaller window, a single 16-paned, mullioned window also features a similar memorial stain-glass design. Most, if not all, window panes are original. Each window is recessed in a Romanesque arch with a native rock bay complete with native stone sills. All arch features are highlighted with wedge-shaped rocks arranged in a semicircular Romanesque arch design. A small, nine-square vent located in the gable end is made of rock and provides attic ventilation.

East Elevation

The east elevation includes the east and north face of the castellated tower. Four rectangular nine-over-nine double hung windows fenestrate the east elevation. Two nine paned windows located along the foundation of the east elevation provide light to the basement area. An interior metal chimney is located between the first and second window.

North Elevation

The north elevation is dominated by the native stone chimney. The chimney is centrally placed in the gable roof. The large fireplace box is located in the basement. Two nine-over-nine double hung windows are symmetrically placed on each side of the chimney. A concrete walkway with an iron handrail leads visitors along the north elevation to a shed roof porch located on the west elevation.

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West Elevation

The west elevation is fenestrated with four nine-over-nine double hung windows. Below and off center the upper story windows are four nine-over-nine double hung windows, which provide light to the basement area. A small rock retaining wall runs perpendicular to the west elevation and abuts the west elevation. At the northwest corner of the west elevation is the entrance to the basement area which is sheltered by a wood framed shed roof porch that was constructed within the past 30 years. Two interior metal chimneys are located along the west elevation.

Interior

The chapel's sanctuary features a central aisle that leads to the altar. Two aisles run along the walls. The floor is made from pine, and the pews were handmade. The interior walls are covered with beaverboard. The large altar area is elevated and doubles as a stage. A doorway located at the front of the sanctuary opens up to stairs leading down to the basement

A full, finished basement is located under the chapel's sanctuary. Here the chapel's supporting system of large oak beams and posts are fully visible. For many years the basement floor remained dirt. At an unknown date, concrete was laid. Now, the Son's Chapel Rural Builders Association, Inc., holds all its monthly meetings and weekly quilting sessions there. The walls are of the same native fieldstone. A full kitchen is located on the southern end of the room. On the northwest corner of the room is a halfbath. A small stairway at the northeast corner of the room leads up to the sanctuary. The large rock mantle and firebox dominate the north wall.

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SUMMARY

Located at 5480 East Mission (Arkansas Highway 45 East), approximately 3 miles east of Fayetteville, Washington County, is Son's Chapel. Constructed between 1933 and 1937 to serve the community of Son's Chapel, the freestone masonry native stone rustic structure displays Romanesque and Gothic style influences. It is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under **Criterion C** as a unique example of a rustic chapel containing Romanesque and Gothic styles details. It is also being nominated under **Criterion A** for its associations with religious life in Son's Chapel. In addition, it is being nominated under **Criteria Consideration A: Religious Properties**.

ELABORATION

Son's Chapel sits on land that was once part of the original 160-acre tract of Indian lands granted under the Treaty of Dancing Rabbit Creek (August 23, 1842). By 1848, 40 acres of this tract was patented to early settler Michael Son and his wife Nancy. Michael Son had settled on the land the year before. The Sons conveyed property for a church and, in time, a cemetery. The area became known as "Son's Chapel". The original church was located south of the existing structure on the site of the Son's Chapel cemetery.

The construction of Son's Chapel was merely a dream of local community women who, on October 19, 1922, organized for the purpose of erecting a new community building. At that time the community schoolhouse had housed all community functions but, as the community grew, became too small to accommodate community needs. This group of women became known as the Son's Chapel Rural Builders Association, Inc.

Fundraising began immediately. The first project was serving lunches to the crowds gathered at cattle auctions held at the various community farms which netted \$200. Through the years, their "nest egg" grew through such fundraisers until they raised \$1,400 ten years later.

The group of women began to look for a building site. A building committee was formed to locate suitable land. On June 3, 1933, W. R. and Grace Reed Porter, who owned a portion of the original Michael Son land, donated the land on which to erect the new building.

It was decided that the building's dimensions would be 36 feet by 50 feet with a basement of the same size for community social activities and a sanctuary upstairs for religious events. Excavation began in 1933 and the men of the community volunteered to donate their labor and that of their horses and mules. One unknown carpenter and one unknown stonemason were hired for the project. Each day, the women coordinated the volunteer laborers. Within 77 days of team work, 260 days of labor, and 330 days laying approximately 8,167 feet of stone, the structure took shape.

Meanwhile, fundraising continued and many donations were made of supplies and furnishings. Sometime between 1936 and 1937, the outer stone walls, roof, and windows were in place. However, the interior was not furnished. With the building funds running very low, the women decided to organize a drama club and hold a series of plays. With proceeds from the plays, lumber was purchased with which to make benches.

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Completion of the interior began in 1937 with the design assistance of Thayer Shelton, prominent Fayetteville architect. On May 26, 1940, Son's Chapel was dedicated as a community Protestant church. Through the years, church services became less frequent. Only a community Sunday school continued to meet there until a few years ago. Now the structure is used for community functions, weddings, and funerals. The Son's Chapel Rural Builders Association, Inc., meets weekly in the chapel to quilt and each month to hold a business meeting to make decisions and plan activities in order to support and maintain the structure. This group continues to preserve and maintain the property as a symbol and tribute to the perseverance, dedication, and spirit of the Son's Chapel community.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located at 5480 East Mission (Arkansas Highway 45 East), approximately 3 miles east of Fayetteville, Washington County, is Son's Chapel. Constructed between 1933 and 1937 to serve the community of Son's Chapel, the freestone masonry native stone rustic structure displays Romanesque and Gothic style influences. 
VERBAL BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

This boundary contains the structure and sites associated with the Son's Chapel that retains its historic integrity.




