7. Description

The Wellsville Tabernacle stands on the southeast corner of the Wellsville town square. Built from 1902 to 1908, it is in the Gothic Revival style reminiscent of the late nineteenth century ecclesiastical work of Richard Upjohn and others who popularized the style. The building is 65 by 115 feet, with a cross gable on the north side projecting slightly. A tower at the southeast corner dominates the main facades.

The gabled roofs emphasizes the building's verticality. Buttresses at the corners and at the windows on three facades are capped with short octagonal pinnacles. The tower includes pinnacles at the corners, pierced by blind pointed arches.

The main entrance is centered under the large window on the east wall. Three of the four facades include a gabled roof framing a large Gothic window with corbeled pointed arches.

Built on a raised, rusticated sandstone foundation, the brick of the building has been painted white. After a fire in 1959, the tower was lowered and the central spire reduced in size. A one story, one room extension has been built on the north wall of the building.

The interior of the tabernacle includes a floor plan unusual in Mormon churches. The main vaulted space has the pulpit in the northwest corner. The main aisle extends on a diagonal from the entrance under the corner tower. Pews are arranged in semicircular rows facing the pulpit in the corner. Behind the pulpit on the west wall is a semicircular apse for the choir and organ. A new pipe organ was installed in 1928. Balconies on the east and south walls of the chapel are well lit by the pointed arch windows. A few of the original slatted pews remain in the balconies. A 1928 remodeling included new, more elaborate oak pews.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Wellsville Tabernacle is one of two tabernacles in Cache Valley, and dominates the south end of the valley. Built during the years 1902 to 1908, it demonstrates the persistence of the Mormon village form, based on cooperative idealism. In spite of alterations, primarily to the tower, the architectural form and imposing scale make the tabernacle one of the four major landmarks in the Mormon settlements of northern Utah.

Plans for the Wellsville Tabernacle were prepared by the architect C.T. Barrett under the direction of Bishop Evan R. Owen. Ground was broken in 1902 by former Bishop William H. Maughn who had served as bishop for forty years. The cornerstones were laid by Apostle Owen Woodruff and President Seymour B. Young in 1903. It was dedicated June 28, 1908 by Anton H. Lund of the Mormon Church's First Presidency.

All the materials came from local sources. A rock quarry, a lime kiln and a brickyard were operated by local men. William S. Poppleton supervised the stone work, quarried in nearby Sardine Canyon. Job Miller Sr. made the red brick, which was laid by Fred Douglas and Co. Alex Hill provided the rough lumber from his sawmill in Blacksmith Fork Canyon. Thomas Thorpe Sr. directed the plaster work and the Brenchley Brothers did the iron work. Daniel and William Walters and Francis O. Gunnell were responsible for the carpentry work. Professor Emil Hansed, a landscape gardener, supervised the planting of the lawn, shrubs, and trees. The total cost of the building was \$65,000.
