DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Delfelder Hall is located in the Wind River Valley of Wyoming, at a point four miles north of the town of Riverton. Facing west, the hall is a large (82' 5" x 24' 5"), rectangular, one-story, stuccoed building. It has a hipped roof that is intersected at the middle on the west side by a cross gable over the main, double-door entryway. Both the main roof and the cross gable are covered with asbestos shingles. The roof is penetrated by a small brick chimney and two metal ventilators, the latter located on the ridge. The west, or main, elevation of the building contains fourteen window openings and a large transom, all presently boarded up. On the rear, or east side, of the building is attached a small shed-roofed addition, to which is attached a smaller, gable-roofed addition.

The entryway leads into a small vestibule which, in turn, opens to the main hall. The interior is divided into two spaces: a kitchen (30' x 23') in the south end, and a meeting room (50' x 23') in the north end. Interior walls and ceilings are plastered and painted. The floor of the meeting room is oak and that of the kitchen is pine. In 1943 alterations were made in the main section by the removal of partitions separating two classrooms, and by the construction of two small restrooms at its south end. In 1946 the hall was painted inside and out, the attic insulated, storm windows installed, and the roof covered with asbestos shingles. When the Grange acquired a lease on the hall in 1968, other improvements were made: a central heating system, augmented by three space heaters, was installed. Double sinks were added to the kitchen, flourescent lights were hung from the ceiling, and some furniture was purchased from Grange members.

At times in the past a custodian occupied a portion of the building. When that practice was discontinued, acts of vandalism occurred in which the windows of the building were broken. As a result the Grange offered a free mobile home space near the hall and the vandalism was stopped.

Delfelder Hall displays no particular architectural style or merit. It is a plain, but apparently sound, building that derives its significance from its role in local history.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

On September 8, 1908, about two years following the founding of Riverton, Mary J. Freeman filed on a 160-acre homestead located four miles north of the town. Early in March, 1909, Mary's residence, located north of the present Delfelder Hall Building, was used as a school that was taught by a teacher named Miss Jordan. The Freeman residence was the first of three schools located on that piece of land.

In 1910 the Freeman property was sold to Jacob Delfelder, from whom the hall derives its name. Delfelder's property became mortgaged, and was involved in litigation that finally was settled in the Wyoming Supreme Court, and in 1939 it passed into the ownership of Fremont County School District #25. On August 7, 1920 the directors of the school district let a contract to the firm of Westerlund and Schodin for the construction of a four-room school house to cost \$8,600. By the time the Delfelder Consolidated School opened on January 10, 1921, the second school built on the property had been sold and moved away. Delfelder Consolidated School was open for a period of eight years, and was officially closed on June 7, 1929 because modern means of transportation allowed students to attend schools in town.

Although it was built as a school, the Delfelder building also served as a community social center. For two or three years programs were held there by the Delfelder League, a local community organization. Twice each month during the winter the League held socials in which skits, dialogues and music recitals were presented, followed by dancing. Sometimes the affairs were pie socials and box suppers, and on occasion midnight lunches were eaten while children slept on benches covered with coats. These gatherings were attended by not only residents of the rural countryside, but also by people from the town of Riverton.

On April 10, 1940 local residents held a meeting at the school building and formed the Delfelder Hall Association, with Luther Sproule acting as temporary chairman and Laura Rock acting as temporary secretary. The purpose of the organization, which was composed of any who cared to join, was to acquire, hold, and keep in repair the Delfelder School for the use and benefit of the community in holding religious, charitable, social and educational functions. The first elected officers of the Association were: Luther Sproule, President; Laura Rock, Secretary; and Laura Rock, D. T. Botts, Oscar N. Nicholson, and L. J. Scheurman, Directors. The Delfelder School building was purchased by the Association for \$575, an amount which, together with the cost of building modifications, was paid in part by funds raised through turkey dinners and dances. The debt on the purchase was fully paid by January, 1943. Other Association fund-raising efforts, for the purpose of improving and maintaining the building, took the form of pie socials, card parties, and farm sales. Members of the Association also raised money over the years by

cooking and serving at banquets for other organizations, such as the Lions Club.

Over the years the hall has been open, for rent, to anyone in the community. Fremont County election officers have used the hall as a polling place, and the Riverton Fire Protection District and various irrigation districts have also used the hall for elections within their own organizations. Members of the Riverton Valley Women's Extension Club and Four-H, or rural youth organizations, have also utilized the hall. Another group which has held its meetings at the hall, and whose members have donated labor and materials for the maintenance and improvement of the building, is the Riverton Valley Grange, which in 1968 obtained a long-term lease on the building. The Grange meets there twice each month, and the Fremont County Pamona Grange meets at the hall once a month. Each fall Riverton Valley honors the Riverton Volunteer Firemen and their wives with a dinner, as a token "Thank You" to them for their community service. At least one wedding, several fiftieth wedding anniversary celebrations, and a funeral have also been held in Delfelder Hall.

Delfelder Hall should be included in the National Register because of its historical role as the site of an early educational institution in the Riverton Valley, but particularly because of its long history as a rural community meeting house. It has been a place where citizens representing a variety of organizations have gathered together for entertainment and for the social, political and economic advancement of the community. In that many persons have worked many hours on fund-raising projects to support the maintenance and improvement of Delfelder Hall, the building is also an historical example of public spirit, of cooperation between people in a particular geographic area. That spirit of cooperation is reflected in projects completed in the past, and it is hoped that spirit will continue and that the hall will be preserved. Enrollment of the building in the National Register can provide assistance to those who want to preserve that spirit by preserving the Delfelder Hall.

Dear Mr. Murtagh:

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of a change necessary in the Delfelder School House (Delfelder Hall) nomination submitted to you last year. According to Mr. Ray Luce, the nomination is currently under review by your staff.

The change relates to Section 10, "Geographical Data", on page four of the nomination form. The phrase "less than one acre" ought to be substituted for the present figure, 1.49 acres. The property nominated for enrollment should be only the building itself, and I understand that since the property is less than one acre, no verbal boundary description is necessary. Therefore the present boundary description ought to be deleted.

I hope this letter may serve as an addendum to the nomination. However, if you need further information concerning the Delfelder School House nomination, please let me know and I will be happy to provide whatever I can. Thank you for your attention to this matter.
