Thomas Lenehan House

Sited along Delmont's Main Street, the Thomas Lenehan House is a twostory Queen Anne dwelling that features a metal onion-shaped dome atop a side tower. Rising from a concrete foundation and basement, the rectangular wood frame house is sided with both fish-scale shingles and clapboard. It is capped by an irregular roof, covered with asphalt shingles. An open porch wraps around the south (front) and west facades. The only obtrusive alteration on the south street facade is a modern casement window that replaces an original double-hung window. An aluminum storm door protects an historic entry door.

The interior is approximately two bays wide and three bays deep and based on an informal floor plan. Although the house has been remodeled in recent times (1976) to accommodate use as rental apartments, the division of space has not been altered. In addition, many elements of the original decor remain intact, including a hardwood stairway, moldings, and pocket doors. However, most walls have been paneled with modern materials, and the first floor ceilings have been lowered.

A modern wood frame garage (non-contributing) is located few yards northeast of the house.

At present, the house is used as a fashion boutique and private residence of its owner.

Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, the Thomas Lenehan House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is believed to be the only residence in the state that features an onionshaped dome. Although it has suffered some alteration in recent years, the house still retains most of its identity as a late Queen Anne dwelling. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan the property relates to the historic context labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, D.2. Urban Development/Residences.

The Lenehan House includes such Queen Anne stylistic characteristics as an irregular roof line, informal entry and floor plan, multiplicity of siding material, a wrap-around porch, and the distinctive side tower. Although, its influence is unknown, the metal onion-shaped dome is of particular significance. No other house recorded in the state has exhibited this design element. For many years, local residents have known as the property "the Onion House".

Douglas County was organized in 1882 and the City of Delmont was founded three years later. Thomas Lenehan was a prominent early citizen of Delmont and an active carpenter throughout the county. In 1902, he built this house as his private dwelling. During this same year he constructed the Delmont Public School. In 1915, Lenehan lost the property to foreclosure. Shortly thereafter, Dr. Thomas Arnold began operating a clinic and hospital in the house. A local impliment dealer, Charles Sroka, purchased the house from Arnold in 1920. Sroka owned the property until 1939. Since that time, it has been used as a beauty shop and apartments, as well as a private residence.

In 1983, Russel and Verla Lehman bought the house. Verla Lehman now operates a fashion boutique in the lower level and uses the upper level as her residence. She continues to keep the house in a good state of repair and to call public attention to its history.

The period of significance of the property spans from its construction in 1902 to 1937, the established 50-year cut off for the National Register. **United States Department of the Interior** National Park Service
