#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Wedged on a narrow lot approximately 26½ feet wide between the three-story Worthen Building to the east and the one-story J.J. Newbury store to the west, the former Wheelock Law Office is located on the north side of North Main Street with its main (south) elevation oriented toward the street. The building originally was square in plan, measuring approximately 21½ feet across each elevation, but presently (1975) masks a flat-roofed, one-story rear addition of brick, load bearing construction on a reinforced concrete foundation. The original interior of the building has been completely altered through continuous remodelling.

A one-story building with a belcast, slate-covered, mansard roof and a slender, mansard-roofed, two-story entrance tower on the east corner of the main elevation, the building is of brick, load bearing construction laid in common stretcher bond and sits on a rubblestone foundation with cut granite blocks above grade. The entrance tower measures approximately 6½ feet square and projects out from the wall surface of the main elevation approximately 1½ feet.

The belcast of the mansard roof on both the main block of the building and the tower projects out from the wall surface on each elevation (the rear elevation has been covered by the rear addition) approximately 1½ feet and is supported by an elaborate, wood modillion cornice. The cornice is broken across the main elevation by a segmental arch on the main block and by a gable arch on the tower. Around the tower between the first and second story the cornice on the main block flattens out into a decorative band of punched-out circles. The mansard on the main block is punctuated by two gable dormers on either side of a bull's eye dormer across the main elevation and by two gable dormers on the west and north elevations. Each elevation of the tower mansard is punctuated by a bull's eye.

The main tower entrance is a round-arched opening and originally had a wood hood broken by a segmental arch and was supported by elaborate brackets. The second-story windows on the tower's main and east elevations are also round-arched with projecting, wood hood moldings. Originally, a pair of slender, round-arched windows with one slightly shorter round-arched window flanking either side illuminated the first story across the main elevation. These were replaced in circa 1925 by the present (1975) plate glass display window which runs the length of the elevation to the tower and projects out from the wall surface approximately  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet. The original windows also had projecting wood hood moldings with finialed cresting as did the other windows, dormers, and the hood above the tower entrance.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Wheelock Law Office is significant as an excellent example of French Second Empire style domestic architecture. The building was erected in 1871 by Langdon C. Wheelock, a reknowned Barre lawyer, for use as a law office and courtroom. When built, the building was adjacent to Wheelock's house, a brick Federal style residence erected in 1825 by Newell Kinsman, also a reknowned Barre lawyer. Wheelock studied law with Kinsman and in 1856 bought his law practice, law office, and house. Following Wheelock's death in 1873, the building was occupied by the Granite Savings Bank and Trust Company and later by the Barre Electric Company.

Equally significant, the Wheelock Law Office is the only surviving domestically-scaled building on this end of North Main Street. Throughout most of the nineteenth century North Main Street was a tree-lined thoroughfare flanked on either side by imposing residences. In the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries a large scale industrial boom, brought about by a rapidly developing granite industry, accelerated the city's commercial growth and resulted in the demolition of most of the residences on this end of North Main Street to accommodate the city's need for more commercial facilities. Wedged on a narrow lot between commercial buildings, the Wheelock Law Office is an important visual reminder of North Main Street's pre-commercial, nineteenth century domestic scale.
