On January 26, 1839, a law was passed providing that a penitentiary should be located at a place not more than fifty miles from the center of the state, the site to be selected by the Alabama Legislature. A sum of \$30,000 was appropriated with which to purchase the necessary land and erect the buildings. Land was obtained in Elmore County on the east bank of the Coosa River not far from Wetumpka.

The cornerstone was laid <u>March 14, 1840</u>, and the buildings were constructed by <u>W. H. Thomas</u>. The keys to the building were given to Alabama State Prison Commissioners on October 27, 1841, and the first warden, William Hogan, assumed charge.

The administration of the penitentiary from the outset was unprofitable and unsatisfactory. During the first four years of its history the excess of expenditures over receipts was \$31,980.69. The original cost of the buildings had been more than \$84,000 and during 1844 the frame workshops in the yg ard had been destroyed by fire. Public dissatisfaction with the operation of the penitentiary grew.

As a result of this dissatisfaction, an act was passed during the legislative session of 1845 authorizing the lease of the penitentiary. The law constituted the person leasing the prison as warden with full authority over the convicts and held him responsible for the preservation of the state's property.

From 1845 to 1862 the property was leased three times. The third lease was to Dr. Ambrose Burrows from 1858 to 1862. In 1862 Dr. Burrows was killed by a convict and the penitentiary reverted to the state. Dr. M. G. Moore was appointed warden.

During the War Between the States any prisoner who would enlist in the Confederate army was pardoned, and remaining prisoners worked to manufacture

articles for the Confederate soldiers. In 1865 federal troops opened the doors of the penitentiary and freed all of the convicts.

In 1866 Governor Robert M. Patton made another lease. Two individuals, Smith and McMillan, were to operate the penitentiary with a \$15,000 loan from the state. Shortly after the beginning of the Smith-McMillan lease, an act was passed allowing them to sublet convicts to work outside the pentitentiary as a means of meeting operating expenses. The arrangement was highly unsuccessful and the loan was never repaid, but the practice of subcontracting prison labor continued until the turn of the century when the pentitentiary was adapted to house only women prisoners.

In 1942 the women's prison was relocated at Tutwiler prison and the buildings emptied. At present the Alabama State Penitentiary is used for industrial storage, but the Elmore County Historical Society plans to obtain the property and restore the remaining structures for use as offices and a museum.
