The Second Dexter House is an architecturally significant example of eclectic residential architecture at the turn of the century. The design includes two intersecting gambrel roofs with compound arch window hoods. Like the other few brick houses in town, the Dexter House is an individual design illustrating the wide range of options available to builders of the period. Dexter was the owner of the local brickyard and this was his second house in town. He later sold the house to Dewey Whipple of the Edwards Department Store.

Additional Descripton of Physical Appearance & Significant Architectural Features:

(Architectural significance; can include interior & site features; address integrity issues specifically)

This is a 1½ story cross gambrel roofed house on the banks of Patit Creek. It is built of Dexter brick with a cut stone foundation. The roofline has flared returns and boxed eaves. There is a small gambrel roof wall dormer on the front of the cross gambrel. The windows are all one over one double hung with round arch, topped with a brick drop label with stone keystone. A projecting bay contains triple rounded windows with the same brick drop labels. One window in the center of the front gambrel is a gothic shaped 3 pane transom over a double hung one over one. The ridge chimney is of ornate brick design. The front door is new, but has a segmental arch. The porch is a flat roofed side porch with inappropriate wrought iron balustrade and porch supports. It is a one-of-akind home in Dayton.
