Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located on the eastern side of State Highway 585 about five miles north of its intersection with U.S. Highway 98, China Grove Methodist Church is a simple frame Greek Revival church that rests upon brick foundation piers. All elevations of the church are sheathed in wooden lap siding with an unmolded base. The westerly gable-end facade and the easterly rear elevation feature a molded raking board and are further enlivened by the returns of the molded cornices of the side elevations. Although the southerly side elevation is a four-bay composition of windows, the northerly elevation differs in having an additional bay occupied by a single-leaf, molded, four-panel door set beneath a tall transom. This doorway, located in the westernmost bay, opens directly into a stairway providing access to the slave gallery. The rear, or easterly, elevation is divided into two bays consisting of a window and a doorway matching the doorway of the northerly side elevation. All window and doorway openings have unmolded surrounds with the suggestion of a drip cap, and all window openings are filled with unusually narrow, twelve-over-twelve, double-hung sash and are closed by original shutter blinds. The entrance doorway is located in the center-bay of the three-bay facade and is filled with double-leaf, molded, four-panel doors set beneath a transom. 10.0

The interior space of the church is undivided with a slave gallery at the western end and a raised chancel area with pulpit at the eastern end. The interior walls and ceiling are finished in horizontal matched boards with a wide, unmolded baseboard, and all interior door and window facings are unmolded. An unusual, apparently original, panel of horizontal matched boards stands behind the center back pew to screen the entrance area from the seating area. The sides and backs of the pews, which are original, are constructed of vertical matched boards, and the pews have shallow seating. The slave gallery, which is supported by molded box columns, is accessed by an open, singleflight stairway that runs in a southerly direction and is entered from an exterior doorway on the northern side elevation. The circular handrail of the stairway, which features rectangular-sectioned balusters, is mortised into the door surround rather than a newel to provide a sense of separation from the seated congregation. The box columns supporting the slave gallery are echoed on the gallery level by additional box columns which extend to the ceiling, and the slave gallery is railed like the stairway. The raised chancel differs from the gallery and stairway by having a turned baluster railing. The well detailed, molded pulpit, which is wide and low, is adorned with pilasters and three rectangular panels of horizontal matched boards.

Adjacent to the church building, on its southern side, is the church cemetery.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Completed in 1861, just before the onset of the Civil War, China Grove Methodist Church is one of Mississippi's unique expressions of rural, vernacular, ecclesiastical architecture. The church is simply constructed but rendered architecturally significant by the rarity of pre-Civil War rural churches in the state, but its unusual architectural features, and by its outstanding architectural integrity. Replacement by more modern structures and dwindling congregations resulting from the automobile age and migration to the city have been instrumental in the loss of many such church buildings throughout Mississippi. Many of those that survive have been extensively renovated or, like China Grove, are endangered by not having active congregations. China Grove is used today for irregular church services, "homecoming" events, weddings, and funerals. The construction of the slave gallery at China Grove may be unique among pre-Civil War Mississippi churches, because the gallery is constructed like a double-tiered porch with gallery-level columns extending to the ceiling and with an exterior doorway opening into the gallery stairway and the stairway railing extending beyond the bottom step and being mortised into the doorway surround. The creation of a vestibule effect by the erection of a horizontal matched-board panel, or screen, is another unusual feature of the church. The rhythm created by the use of matched boards for walls, ceilings, church pews, and the decorative panels in the pulpit adds architectural interest to the interior. Although China Grove is one of the two earliest settlements in Walthall County, only the church survives as a reminder of the community, settled ca. 1815, that once boasted a post office, school, and numerous houses. China Grove Methodist Church is the second church to be constructed on its site. It replaced a log Baptist Church that was constructed in the early nineteenth century and was acquired in 1836 by the Methodist Church who later built the present building.
