Describe present and historic physical appearance.

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This is a two story sandstone building, 22 feet wide by 40 feet long. Built in 1901, it is entirely native stone with no brickwork except the chimneys. This reflects an early period in Vale, for most of the native stone buildings of the period are demolished, altered, or abandoned. Buildings of 1906 on used local bricks in addition to stone. The architectual style is Richardsonian Romanesque, and the main builder and architect was probably one of the Hope brothers, Milton G. or Isaiah W., early settlers and business men. Three stone buildings are directly attributed to the Hope brothers: A stone residence, a stone store, and the stone First Bank. All are still in use.

Although constructed in less that three months, the workmanship and materials are quite good. The building was used for a bank for less than seven years, before being sold back to the Hope Bros when the 1907 Drexel Hotel and Bank was built.

At this present date, the facade of the building is essentially unchanged except for work before 1906, replacing store front 4-pane windows with plate glass, and the side exterior stair was removed. Other extensive remodeling was done before 1906, but only minor changes since then. The interior has suffered water damage and poorly carried out remodeling. A 60 foot cinderblock addition was added in the rear in 1980.

The current owner, the writer, is working to make the property relatively presentable and usable, and registered as a National Register site, as directed in purchase agreements with the County.

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The First Bank of Vale faces West on Main Street which is the original Oregon Trail route. It is a two-story, twenty-two by forty foot stone building made entirely of native sandstone with the exception of four brick chimneys. The exterior mortar is a lime and sand mix. The exterior wall construction is sixteen inches thick.

The West facing exterior front facade features twelve distinct Richardsonian details, referenced in a list titled "Romanesque Details" accompanied with photos. The stereo-typic bank facade features two large first story plate-glass arched windows connected visually by running decorative stone work. The first floor windows and large windowed front door all have transoms including two with segmented stained glass lunettes. All the facade openings stress the massive and deep set Romanesque style as exemplified by the single sandstone ledge twelve inches by fourteen inches by six feet under the front, first story windows.

The second story front facade features two transomed sash windows with granite lintels and Richardsonian arches. The facade is capped by off-set sandstone blocks which visually lead to the building center. The building is crowned with a rare and unique pinnacle made up of a pedestal and ball design. The entire facade consists of rectangular dressed sandstone left with rock facing.

The South side of the First Bank of Vale is essentially unaltered with the exception of the removal of an original external staircase and the alteration of an original doorway to a window. The south side consists of uncoursed, random-sized rubble fill with dressed facings and granite lintels.

The North side of the First Bank of Vale is partially obscured to the second story level by an adjacent structure. The second story has two four foot by eight foot steel framed, twenty-four pane windows that are probably not original. The North side consists of uncoursed, random-sized rubble fill with dressed facings.

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The East-facing rear of the First Bank of Vale is obscured to the second story by a cinder block, twenty-two by sixty foot addition built in 1980. An original exterior door now opens into the addition and an original five foot by seven foot exterior opening that features a seven foot granite lintel has been closed by the cinder block construction. This filling may be the result of the fracture and repair of the lintel with bolted segments of railroad iron. The second story has an original window which has been cemented closed. An original exterior doorway which now opens onto the roof of the addition, indicates the prior existence of another exterior stairway. The rear wall consists of uncoursed, random-sized rubble fill with dressed facings.

The original flat roofing is indeterminable. However, it currently consists of rolled-felt and asphalt. The stepped walls continue two to three feet above the roof.

The original flooring has since been obscured by a concrete slab poured prior to 1980.

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HISTORIC AND PRESENT APPEARANCE

FACADE: As can be seen by included photos the original front of the building is essentially unchanged from completion of the bank.

- 1. The store front windows were changed from 4 pane to plate glass before 1906.
- 2. The exterior side stairs were removed probably when the next door brick building was built before 1906

ORIGINAL INTERIOR: I have little information on the interior. If the building had 6 wood stoves, (as indicated by the openings; four original chimneys , two of which operated two stoves,) the layout might be something like:

First floor: Three rooms: (1) main floor, 22'X27' ft (2) vault, 6'X12' and (3) freight/rear entrance /storage room, 14'X12.5 ft.

Second floor: I believe had: (4 & 5) two long office rooms, 11'X 28' each orientated to the front arched windows looking over the street, amd (6 & 7) a rear second story entrance and room 14' X 12' and room, 8' X 12'. The second story had a side exterior stair and a rear exterior stairway.

I think that the interior was remodeled extensively at an early date such as 1906, the first change in ownership and building function, and much crowding of the building took place. The removal of the exterior stairway would have been necessary at an early date. The distinctive corner blocks can be used perhaps to determine this FIRST REMODEL layout.

FIRST REMODEL

First floor: As stated, the side stairwas was removed, and a interior stair was created near the entrance by cutting 8-15" joists; supporting them with a new wall. This created a entrance room of 5' X 6' that both the entrance door and a 4' stair door swing into. The stairway corridor is 5' wide by 22 feet long. The main store room became the size of 16.5 by 27. This remodel must of been opportune for the installation of electrical wiring and plumbing, and the removal of the outhouses formerly under the exterior stair. Accordingly, a bathroom was installed underneath the new interior stair, and also some sort of washroom in the rear storage room, and running up of sewer pipe to the second floor. The rear storage room wall was redone to include a 6-pane opaque window for lighting from the front room. At this time or before the 5-foot freight entrance granite lintel cracked and was braced by a span of railroad rail.

Second floor: a bathroom, $8' \times 12'$ was installed in the rear south room. A wall was made or moved to make walking room from leaving the stairway, making a $12' \times 18'$ living room.

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SECOND REMODEL

I suggest that further remodeling took place when use of the building for family apartments began, perhaps in the 1930's, or as late as 1940's. The building changed hands so much after the 40's I suspect no alterations were made until the 1970's and '80s First floor: At this time or before the rear 5-foot freight entrance was plastered over.

Second floor:

The upper offices were closed into square rooms, 11° X 11° , perhaps for bedrooms. The rear storage room became a Kitchen, 18° X 12° .

with a formed concrete chiminey. Two 4 by 8 foot metal and glass pane windows were cut into the north wall. The rear window in the second story bath was concreted over.

THIRD REMODEL:

As I suggested, no futher remodeling may have taken place until the late '70s First floor: The ceiling of the main store front was lowered by nailing 2X8's directly into the stone walls and interior wall. This lowering biscected the arched windows, so some arching molding was removed and the ceiling met in mid-pane. The glass was painted over in the upper segments.

Second story:

A fire at some time charred the second story joists. These damaged joists were braced and doubled, and the ceiling lowered on the side opposite the stairway, again with the disconcerting effect of ending mid-pane of the arched second story window.

FOURTH REMODEL

Efforts by Fred Burgess to make the building into a museum included pouring a cement floor into the main store room and the rear storage room. He attached fence mesh to the windows for security. He built a 60 foot cinderblock addition to the rear of the building, with a cement floor, and cinder blocked closed the 5 foot freight entrance.

FIFTH REMODEL

Residential use included substancial removal previous remodeling, but did not proceed very far, leaving much debris and a leaking roof, and abandonment.

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SUMMARY

The First Bank of Vale, located on the east side of Main Street near the major street intersection in the historic trading center of Vale on the Malheur River in the central Snake River basin area of eastern Oregon, was built entirely of native sandstone in 1901. It is significant in the context of Vale's period of greatest commercial upbuilding, 1895 to 1907.

The two-story building has a footprint of 22 x 40 feet, and its minor frontage is on Main Street. Together with larger commercial buildings of brick and sandstone anchoring the four corners of the intersection of Main and A Streets, the First Bank of Vale makes up a cohesive grouping at the hub of the community that became established on the route of the Oregon Trial. The buildings are related visually by their common materials and stylistic character based on Italianate and Romanesque traditions. As the most intact and clear-cut example of vernacular architecture based on the Richardsonian Romanesque style, the bank meets National Register Criterion C and lends a degree of character to the streetscape that exceeds its compact proportions.

Briefly characterized, the main volume is constructed of randomrange dressed sandstone over rubble on secondary elevations, and the street elevation is faced with rock-cut masonry and bold trim elements that are hallmarks of the Romanesque style. The built-up roof is screened by a parapet wall that is finished straight on the facade, with a coping course and a central triangular crest with Facade openings are symmetrically arranged and ball finial. consist of two tall Roman-arched windows on the second story and a three-part arcade on the ground story that is composed as a doorway (at the south end) and an adjoining pair of storefront windows all linked by Romanesque archivolts and rock-faced voussoirs with stylized lobular ornament pendant from the imposts. All window openings are trimmed with massive rock-faced lug sills. window and door assemblies incorporate either round-headed toplights or fan lights. Ground story windows are fixed-pane plate Second story double-hung sash have one-over-one lights. Brick chimneys that vented heating stoves are intact, except for their flared caps, two each inside the parapets of side elevations.

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The building was modified at an early date, about 1906, when the outside stairway to the second story that was on the south elevation was removed and a stair hall was added inside the front entry. At the same time, divided storefront windows were replaced by the existing plate glass. Despite a succession of modifications in later years that do not qualify as historic alterations, original trim elements and finishes do survive on the interior, particularly in the upstairs office spaces. Window and door trim is good, standard millwork of the day, characterized by channeled, or beaded frames with ornamented corner blocks. In 1980 the building footprint was extended 60 feet to the rear lot line by a single-story cinder block addition that has a garage bay on the alley.

The masonry work, attributed to the Hope Brothers, Milton and Isaiah, is of superior quality, and the bank building is one of three stone buildings in Vale attributed to the local masons to date.

The banking institution that raised the building in 1901 was the first of its kind to commence operation in a building of permanent construction. Its incorporators had an important role in financing the Vale Hotel, also known as the Drexel Hotel, the pivotal threestory building of 1908 on the opposite side of Main Street which has been listed in the National Register. The First Bank of Vale was an enduring institution that outlasted and subsumed its rival, the First National Bank.

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Vale was the first permanent settlement on the Oregon Trail in Malheur County. Anchored by the construction of the Stone House in 1872, and its subsequent expansion, the community began to burgeon with commerce. A frame blacksmith and stable shop was constructed shortly after the Stone House to service stage-coach and wagon traffic. The Hope Brothers Mercantile was constructed in 1893. The Bank, a necessity for business development, was built in 1901. These early buildings defined the downtown core and were constructed within a block proximity of one another facing on the Oregon Trail.

The Rineharts, who built the Stone House, had come to Malheur County from the Willamette Valley, to supply fresh beef to the booming mining towns of Eastern Oregon and Southwestern Idaho. The influx of cattle established an industry which exists today and required the support of banking. And, in 1901, the First Bank of Vale was constructed to service the rural community growth and commerce development of Vale.

Elwood C. Clark, the first Clerk, established the Wool Growers Association as the sheep industry encroached upon the cattlemen. Massive land grabs followed with the establishment of huge holding companies like the Pacific Land and Stock Company headquartered in Winnemucca, Nevada, and stretching beyond the boundaries of several states. The First Bank of Vale served as a catalyst and necessary step in the subsequent growth of Vale and led to its establishment as the Malheur County seat.

The entrepreneur Hope Brothers, were responsible for the subsequent construction of at least two additional stone buildings in Vale. The \$100 with which they began their business holdings, stimulated the growth of Vale's downtown on the Oregon Trail which today includes the Drexel Hotel and Stone House, both National Historic Buildings.

The sandstone which was used for the construction of the Stone House, Drexel Hotel, and First Bank of Vale, was shipped to Caldwell and Payette for the construction of early buildings in these communities. This same stone was used, for the construction in Vale of the Natatorium, Courthouse, and School House, all of which have since been demolished.

As the transportation system developed, another bank followed in the community, the rival First National Bank built in 1907. Until that time, however, commercial activity centered around the two-story sandstone First Bank of Vale.

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The history of Vale as a town and city begins with Louis B. Rinehart's completion of the stone hotel in 1872, now Known as the Historic Old Stone House. A store was added next to the stone hotel in 1883, a post office in 1884.

The town of Vale was started on the homestead lands of Rinehart, Charles R. Eldredge homestead of 1883, the Hope claims of 1882, and Holland and L. J. Hadley additions. Vale was designated county seat in 1887, and fierce competition to secure permanent status spurred growth between Vale and Ontario. Two elections and the donation of #10,000 (topping Ontario' pledge of #8,000) for the building of a county courthouse led to the construction of a dressed sandstone courthouse in Vale, completed in 1902.

Between the begining and completion of this courthouse the stone First Bank of Vale was built and occupied.

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NATIVE STONE BUILDINGS

The native stone buildings built before 1906 used rough dressed stone blocks quarried east of town (see article VALE BUILDING STONE,

These building with two exceptions (Hope Bros Store 1893) and Fell's Saloon, 1902) generally included arched doorways and windows. (See Richardson Romanesque architectual style-1880 to 1900)

The stone and brick buildings of 1906-14 also featured a seemingly standard arching formula.

The early stone buildings of Vale, after the Stone House (1872); Hope Bros Store (1893); the Natatorium (destroyed by fire), the original school house, the second courthouse, (both demolished) and First Bank of Vale were all built around 1900. The First Christian Church not in the historic district, is also a dressed stone building.

Hotel Drexel, IOOF Hall, (Golden Slipper), and First National Bank, were built around 1907. Many other downtown buildings are old but covered with up-dated materials.

Only two structures in Vale have been protected by historical registary. The Old Stone House is nearly restored, but the other, Hotel Drexel, has been abandoned by the City of Vale after a failed restoration project, and probably be demolished. The local Land Use Plan listes over 10 structures, including 2 houses. The stone residence built by M.G Hope is signicant also.

The First Bank of Vale is within the proposed historic district on Main St. On the block facing the Bank of Vale are three structure similar in style and age. All are owned by the city, and have slim prospects of restoration or even resale. Within a few years the First Bank of Vale will probably be the second oldest building remaining, given the trend of demolishing instead of restoration.

VALE BUILDING STONE

The Best in the West is Found Within One Mile of this City

The native Stone at Vale is recognized as the best in this part of the country, and Mr. Begg, the proprietor of the quarries here, states it is the best he has ever had anything to do with. He stated he had never been in a place where there was obtainable, three different grades and colors of sandstorne for building purposes. He has taken up three different quarries. One has 100 acres in it, and is buff stone of a harder composition than the general run of soft sandstone, and is of dark buff. This he used in the finishing work of the Odd Fellows building, making the top three links from it, and the top trimmings. His other claims are 40 acres each of deeded land. One of these is a hard stone, which he uses for foundation work. It is very light sandstone of fine composites and will withstand almost any amount of pressure. It is impervous to moisture, and makes an excellent base for the lighter weight stone. The other 40 acre tract is the regular stone he uses in the construction of his buildings. When we were talking with him, he said "I come here unheralded, and with a gunny sack on my back. I tramped the hills around Vale for several weeks, hunting just what I wanted, and I found it in the three claims I located, all of which are worth big money when opened up for work. I have built five building in Vale using this stone, and put up the Y.M.C.A building in Payette, the Washington School House, and the Union Block in Caldwell, besides shipping to three different contractors in Caldwell for other big buildings there. I expect to get the stone contract for the new Nyssa School House, which has been let by contract to Harding & Williams of Caldwell. I also built the Sevey building, one of Caldwells fine stone buildings. I am going to Portland, Seattle and Tacoma this coming week, and shall interview the stone contractors there, while down. This stone will sell at a premium over any Pacific Coast stone of which I am acquainted, and I expect to have it on the market in proper shape. I just finished a sandstone monument for William Grant, at Beulah, It stands 5 feet 8 inches high, and is one of the finest sandstone monuments I have ever seen. I used the white sandstone from my quarry, that which you saw a sample of a few days ago, and it worked up better than one would expect. People around here would not buy it of course, generally they would prefer to have me ship it out to the tombstone manafacturies, and then have it shipped back later as tombstones. I have shipped two car loads of this stone to Caldwell Monument works, and have other orders which I expect to fill as soon as I can get at them. My supply of this stone is unlimited, and it works up in better shape than any stone I have ever worked. The base stone is hard and works down almost as smooth as granite and for a sandstone is the very best. have not located any of the red stone but have confined my locations entirely to the buff. It will take \$50,000 to develop these quarries and install the necessary machinery. We will develop these quarries as soon as possible. In the mean time we are shipping out considerable stone."

The beauty of these quarries is the accessibility to market, being less that one mile from Vale and not a mile apart.

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The men and women associated with the Bank as founders and boardmembers were first generation settlers, who succeeded in prospering as individuals, developing homesteads in isolated and hostile conditions, but also as cooperating businessmen and civic leaders. They arrived here by wagon and had a European city built by the time the railroads reached them.

These people were responsible for a number of public buildings and businesses. Size and location notwithstanding, they retained Vale's status as county seat by funding a stone courthouse through private investors and winning three county elections to name the permanent county seat.

This local pioneer bank bested the later rival bank in a race to build new headquarters, resulting in the First Bank's partial financing of the the 3-story Drexel Hotel and Bank to counter the National Bank's two story building. The Hotel suceeded and later the First Bank moved again, buying out the rival bank and becoming the U.S National Bank.

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J. L. COLE, JOSHUA L. COLE- b. Ripley County, Indiana, Mar. 29, 1832. Emigrated west in 1860, moving to Willowcreek after 1868. He was one of the first settlers of the area. He prospered with cattle, orchards, beekeeping and alfalfa. He sold his ranch in 1901 and helped start the First Bank of Vale, serving as president and manager. Settled Willowcreek, helped finance first stone courthouse. He promoted the railroad.

T. W. HALLIDAY- Former frontier sheriff, vice president, First Bank

M. G. HOPE- MILTON G. HOPE, b.Aug. 31,1859, Vernon County, Wisconsin. Life-long business partner with his brother ISAIAH, (I.W Hope) HOPE BROS. Both settled separate homesteads in 1882, and started merchandise store in 1885-87. They prospered from a hundred dollar investment. The stone store still stands, now is Vale Fire Hall. Both men were prosperous land owners and businessmen, and helped found the First Bank of Vale, helped finance first stone courthouse. Milton served as Vice-President. They owned land later Known a Hope Hot Springs. Milton Hope died Jan 29, 1927

FRANK O'NEILL- b. in Ireland, May 10, 1846. Emigrated to America in 1870. Homesteaded in the stock business in Willowcreek in 1882. Lived near what became called O'Neill Hot Springs, a stage stop, where a mysterious attack and murder occured in the fronter isolation. Mr. O'Neill later married a woman injured in the incident. He was a stockholder and director of the First Bank of Yale

ELWDOD C CLARK- Clerk, came from Corvallis for the job. He helped start the Wool Growers Association.

WILLIAM QUINN- b. in Ireland, Dec 18, 1837. Arrived in America ant age of 12. He became engaged in mining operations in Malheur area in 1865, buying a stock ranch in the 1880's. County Assessor. Stockholder and board member of First Bank.

R.A LOCKETT- ROBERT A. LOCKETT, b. Nov. 29 1838, Henderson County, Kentucky. Emigrated west after being discharged from the Confederate Army. Eventually settled in Willowcreek in 1879. As a Representative from Baker County in the State legislature, he wrote the bill that created Malheur County from territory included in Baker County. Later became judge and Justice of the Peace. Stockholder and boardmember of First Bank.

J. C. KELLY, JOSEPH C. KELLY, B. Jan 3 1870, Idaho City, Idaho. His family moved to Willowcreek in 1877. He opened a successful saddle and harness store in Vale 1898, and branch store in Ontario. He was elected county treasurer twice. Stockholder and boardmember of First Bank.

C A THOMAS- Came to Vale area in the 1890's, was deputy sheriff. He became a realtor and may have ran a store and offices in the First Bank of Vale after 1909 to 1911.
BEN W. MULKEY- b. Missouri, Mar. 22, 1874. Came to Malheur county in 1899, worked as clerk and county clerk, in 1920 bought and operated the Malheur Title and Abstract. Dwned First Bank 1933-40.

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OTHER DOCUMENTARY REFERENCES

- (1), (2), (3),: are about the opening of a rival bank in Vale in 1906-07. The rival aspect of Vale banking led to greater efforts by the First Bank of Vale, such as the building of a 3 story bank and hotel, out-doing the First National Bank's two story building.
- (4),(5), announce the success of the First Bank in manuvering to receive U.S. Bank status, which later led to the buying out and closure of the rival First National Bank.
- (6),(7), give information on the size of the new bank and hotel, and the assurance and competence that accompanied its building. Apparently wholely financed by the First Bank, a very solid financial operation.
- (8) appearing next to one of the article about the begining of the rival bank, this article announces the ambitions of the First Bank to build new quarters. The original plan of two stories was expanded to a three story bank and hotel, probably by a collaboration of another planned building aspiration.

They stated they would erect a building of brick 50 by 100 on the Namilton lots which they purchased a few days ago. We wish to state that every big enterprise of this sort cannot help bu work towards a greater and better prosperity for Prosperous Vale.

The new bank was organized the latter part of the week. The stockholders were called together and the officers were elected. The capital stock is placed a \$25,000.00 and the bank will go by the name First National Bank of Vale. The board of directors elected are Ex Gov Morrison of Idaho, I.F.S. Diven and J. P. Dunaway of Vale, S.D. Simpson, cashier Western National of Caldwell, A.L Wallace, cashier Nyssa State Bank, W.D. Graft of Jorden Valley.

The new officers are Ex Gov Morrison, President, J.E Lawrence, V. President, and J.P. Dunaway, Cashier

The new bank will open up for business as soon as they get their books and safe for the east, which they expect in about two weeks

The First National Bank opened its doors Monday in its temporary quarters in the Kelly building. Mr. Dunaway is their cashier and J. L Lawrence is the V.President. They will begin work on a bank home of their own in a very short time, the plans and specifications are now in the hands of their architect and as soon as the weather permits they will put up a first class brick structure. They have purchased the lots formerly owned by Ed Hamilton on the corner of A and Court Sts. The new bank will receive a good patronage from the people.

A bill has been introduce for a U S National Bank with a capital stock of \$100,000.00. 3/5 of the shares are to be purchased by the U.S. Treasury. Branches are to be established an New York, Chicago, New Orleans, Boston, Denver, St. Louise, Cinncinnatti, Portland, and Salt Lake City

The First Bank of Vale, after nine years of successful banking and past the stage of experimental venture has been converted to the United States National Bank with a capital surplus of \$100,000.00. This being the largest capital stock and surplus of any bank in southeastern Oregon

This new building is to be 74 by 94 feet, the first story to be of native gray and buff stone, the second and third storys to be of Boise sand and lime pressed brick. The corner is to be occupied by the First Bank of Vale and to be 25 by 30 feet facing east. The bank is to be in an oak finish. The hotel office will be 25 by 30, dining room 30 by 30, kitchen 25 by 30, barber shop 15 by 25, 2 offices 20 by 25 all composing the lower story. The second and third storys ar to be 54 sleeping rooms, parlor and 10 bathrooms. The building is to be heated with natural hot water. Estimated cost when completed is 30,003.00

MORE BUILDING

The First Bank of Vale shows up well

The Directors of the First Bank of Vale held a meeting at the bank Saturday. These present were T.W. Halliday, J.S. Edwards, Fred Gellerman, A.K. Steuneber and E.A.Clark. J.L.Cole was in California and Tom Turnbull could not be present from Cord.

The meeting was one of the best ever held and means much to Vale as a future city. On ing to their greatly increased business in this city and vicinity, the directors decided to increase the paid up capital from \$25,000 to \$50,000, which with their large surplus and undivided profits makes it as strong a financial institution as any bank in this part of Oregon. The Directors having faith in the future development and growth of this city and country, and feeling that their present banking quarters were not adequate for their present needs, decided to erect a bank building large and commodious enough for some years to come This building will be of native stone and brick, and plans and specifications have been ordered. It will be a two story building, 50 by 94, built on the lot purchased by the bank two years ago on the S.E. corner of Main and A. streets. The bank will occupy the corner room which will be 25 by 50 feet. There will be one large store room joining on the south facing main street, and one facing A street, just back of the banking rooms.

The second story will be used for offices. The building when completed will represent an outlay of from \$15,000 to \$17,000. It will be modern in every respect. With plate glass windows throughout, and heated by steam.

The first Bank of Vale has been doing fine work for the development of Vale and the new building is but one of the many evidences of the leading place it holds in the development of this part of Eastern Oregon. Let the good work go on.

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
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

Outside stairs were removed before 1906 when next door brick building was built. Probably outhouses under stairs would account for very soft soil there.

Building was used for original bank until hotel and bank building was completed in 1906-7.

Electricity has been installed, possible meter box or ? underneath business sign. Harvey's store is two business down, later business sign Harvey's is on First Bank building. Harvey (S.J) owned the building from 1912 to 1918.

"A VALE STREET SCENE about 1906 or 07. The brick building where Harvey's grocery was located was built in 1906. The three buildings now house an apartment used by Erb and Blankinship as an office, the Vale liquor store and finally the Masonic Hall. The High Brothers livery is across C Street and is now occupied by Butler and Looney law office. The scene gives some ida about the amount of freight that was moved from Vale and some idea about the condition of the streets and amount of mud." Malheur Enterprise.
