7. Description

The Scheafe House is sited on a slight rise on the northwest corner of the intersection of 4th and Park Avenues. Located in the North Side neighborhood, the house is one of the many 19th century dwellings in the area.

Two stories in height, the house is constructed of frame and rests on a stone foundation, which is covered with cement. The house consists of a central cubic shape with projecting gables: two on the west, one on the north, one on the east, and one on the south, front facade. Second-story windows are placed within each of these gables. On the first floor the side gables have an additional rectangular bay projection, which is covered with a mansard roof. A porch with stick style details wraps around the front gable on the south and east. All window openings retain their elongated, double-hung 1/1 sash windows. However, in recent years the house was sided over with circa 1950 siding and a new roof was also added. Aluminum storm windows were placed over the originals. Two small additions containing a bath and vestibule were added on the west and east side facades to the rear.

On the interior the house has retained its fine original details. An Eastlake, incised wood mantel is found in the parlor, which matches the machine-made Eastlake moldings found throughout the house. In the 20th century the front parlor and hallway were joined with an open column archway. This molding is all Colonial Revival, but of the same quality as the original and adds architectural interest to the house. Stained glass transoms decorate the original dining room.

To the rear is a one-and-one-half story, frame carriage house (contributing), which has been recently converted to an antique store. A contemporary one-story frame garage (non-contributing) has been built directly to the east of the carriage house.

The present owners have done extensive restoration work on the interior of the dwelling. With Register listing, the owners hope to obtain the funding to remove the siding. Historic photographs show the original design and decoration of the dwelling.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Significant in the area of politics/government, the General Mark Wentworth Sheafe House was the home of one of Watertown's and South Dakota's prominent early citizens. A 1915 biography describes Sheafe as a man closely "identified with the pioneer development of the territory and (who) has as well been a factor in the upbuilding of the state." His house is the most appropriate representative of Sheafe's history.

Born in 1845, Scheafe was descended from an old and politically prominent New England family. Educated for Harvard, he forewent his college education at the outbreak of the Civil War. At the conclusion of the war he moved to Janesville, Wisconsin, and in 1871, to Dakota Territory. He settled in Elk Point, Union County, where he served as mayor six times and operated a lumber and flour milling business. In 1885, he and his wife Agnes, moved to Watertown upon his appointment as Register of the United States Land Office. He served as Register until 1897, and in the meantime served as vice president of the Dakota Loan and Trust Company, as well as territorial and state senator. In 1885, he was also appointed as Colonel of the Second Regiment of the Dakota National Guard and at the outbreak of the Spanish American War in 1898, he and his troops left for Cuba. He was then appointed Brigadier General of the United States Volunteers. After the war, he retired back to South Dakota and took up ranching.

For many years, he was a friend and close associate of Arthur C. Mellette, last territorial governor (1885-1889) and first state governor (1889-1893). Mellette and his associates tried to win for Watertown the designation as state capitol. Sheafe helped promote the business and political life of the city in order to warrant the designation which ultimately went to Pierre.

When Sheafe built his Watertown house in 1886, he named it Liberty Hall. The name was later inscribed in the concrete front path. Although the exterior has been altered, the present owners wish to restore it including removing the circa 1950 siding. Much work has also been done to the interior which reveals the original elegance of the house including its fine Eastlake and Colonial Revival moldings and woodwork.
