

Describe present and historic physical appearance

SUMMARY

The Smith-Austermuhl Company building is a large two-story brick commercial building built in 1920 in Colonial Revival style. It stands at the northwest corner of the intersection of Market and Sixth Streets in central downtown Camden. The building is the design of Thomas Stephen, a local architect who designed many buildings in the Camden area. The Smith-Austermuhl Building is a prominent landmark on Market Street and is within a short distance of the city's other large public and commercial buildings. The building is vacant and boarded up at present but was occupied until very recently. It retains most of its original fabric and the building's integrity is high.

The two story Smith-Austermuhl Building is a large fully-detached commercial building with its main facade on Market Street. This is a broad and busy commercial street, and the building is prominent in the streetscape. The building fills the complete lot on which it stands, and its south and east walls rise directly from the sidewalk. There is no street landscaping in the area. The exterior is of red brick laid in plain bond. A water table tops a granite foundation and continues around the two main sides of the building. A parapet designed to look like a solid balustrade rises above a flat roof.

The facade is five bays wide with the main entrance in the central bay. The door, now boarded up, is within a one bay wide entry porch in which Doric marble columns support a segmentally arched pediment. There is a carved cartouche within the pediment which has a dentilled cornice. The

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above. SUMMARY

The Smith-Austermuhl Company building at the corner of Fifth and Market Streets is the only large office building in Camden which was built specifically for insurance agency offices. There are two other buildings in this multiple property nomination which housed the home offices of insurance companies, but the Smith-Austermuhl company was a broker and agent for many different companies. By 1920 the company had outgrown its small original office and built this large Colonial Revival building to accommodate its expanding business. The building is significant for its association with the growth of the insurance business in Camden in the 1920s. As one of two examples of the work of local architect Thomas Stephen that are in this multiple property nomination the building is also architecturally significant. The Smith-Austermuhl building fits within property type #2, Buildings constructed for the Legal Profession and/or the Insurance Business and within the one context of the multiple property nomination: Banking, the Insurance Business, and the legal profession in the city of Camden, New Jersey from 1873 to 1938.

The Smith-Austermuhl Company building appears to be the only extant building in Camden which was built especially for use by insurance brokers and agents. The New Jersey Insurance laws encouraged agents who represented "foreign" or out-of-state companies to operate in New Jersey and they flourished in Camden during its early twentieth century boom period. At that time Camden's industrial expansion led to a concurrent boom in banking, insurance,

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other bays on the first floor each contain one large window (now boarded up) topped by flat limestone arches with stone keystones. Above each of these windows is a flat panel separating it from the second floor. Five arched windows across the second floor of the facade have stone keystones, sills, and impost. A border of single bricks outlines a huge arch rising from the water table to the top of the second floor windows as if to define an arched reveal. The name of the company is carved in a stone panel at the cornice line in the central bay. Originally the second floor windows held three vertical lights and the first floor windows held one large light with a transom above.

The Sixth Street side of the building is eleven bays wide - all bays are of equal width except one which contains two narrow windows. In each of the other bays a brick arch outlines the first and second floor windows like those on the facade. The first floor windows on the side are now filled with glass brick. Originally there was a gable roofed one-bay-wide entry porch near the center of this side of the building.

The overall dimensions of the building are 60 feet on Market Street by 120 feet on Sixth Street. At the time of its construction there was a Tennessee white marble counter in the general offices and the floors were of double thick maple. Furnishings of mahogany and white enamel decorated the private offices of executives. Smith-Austermuhl occupied the first floor and divided the second floor into 21 offices for rent to other businesses. In the basement there was space for a restaurant.

The Smith-Austermuhl Company building is in good physical condition and retains a high degree of integrity. Built by the Standard Construction Company, the workmanship is excellent. Although some windows are boarded up and others now contain glass brick, there is no question about the reversibility of this alteration. The building meets all the registration requirements for this property type #2, buildings constructed for the legal profession and/or the insurance business, in the multiple property nomination and is an excellent example of a large intact early twentieth century low rise office building.

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and the legal profession. In addition, modern technology such as the automobile and laws including those regarding workmen's compensation made new types of insurance necessary. The Smith Austermuhl Company founded by Andrew B.F. Smith, Charles F. Austermuhl, and David Baird, Jr. handled all types of insurance to meet these new needs. These founders had solid political connections and tended to be promoters of the Greater Camden Movement. They were similar to the founders of other banks and insurance companies. Smith-Austermuhl was also directly involved in real estate by developing Wildwood Avenue off Park Boulevard in 1915.

The Smith-Austermuhl Company started operation in about 1914 in a small building on Market Street. Their combined efforts in real estate and insurance were apparently very profitable, for their new 1920 building was definitely grandiose in comparison to their former offices. The Company contracted with local Camden architect Thomas Stephen for the new building's design. Stephen, who also designed the Central Trust Company building, (which is in this multiple property nomination) conducted a large architectural practice from his Market Street office.

Thomas Stephen began his career as a carpenter, and by 1891 did business as an architect. His designs included work of all types, but among the best known of his works today would be the Harleigh Cemetery Gates on Haddon Avenue. Stephen eventually moved his residence to Merchantville, but his office remained in Camden, where his son eventually also worked with him. Standard Construction Company built the insurance agent's new office building which cost about \$150,000 in 1920. Smith-Austermuhl occupied the entire first floor and divided the second floor into 21 offices for financial and investment firms. The original plan called for a restaurant to occupy the basement. The design is less imposing than that of most of the Neo-Classical Revival banks in this nomination, but the use of classical elements evokes the same image of longevity and solidity.


Although the building is now vacant, it retains most of its original fabric and a high degree of integrity on the exterior. A prominent landmark on Market Street in Camden, the Smith-Austermuhl Building is a tangible reminder of the city's early twentieth century boom in banking and insurance. A 1981 survey of Camden architecture and a 1987 survey of banks, insurance, and legal buildings in Camden both identified this building. The surveys followed federal guidelines and the results are on file at the Office of New Jersey Heritage. The

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

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
preservation planner for the City of Camden and the Office of New Jersey Heritage have evaluated the buildings included in both surveys and determined that the Smith-Austermuhl Company building is eligible for the multiple property nomination on the basis of its history, architectural significance, and integrity.



The Smith-Austermuhl Company began business in its handsome new building at Market and Fifth streets on Monday. The structure is 60 feet wide and 120 feet deep and is reported to have cost in the neighborhood of \$160,000. It has a granite base with Colonial design, tapestry brick and marble silfa. The entrance is pure Italian marble silfa. The entrance is pure Italian marble in the general offices on the first floor; saxt ade, is of Tennessee white marble. The floors are of double thick maple and finely finished. There are private offices for the effects and the furnishings are in makograny and white enamel, producing a beautiful effect. The company occupies the first floor, and the 11 offices on the second door are occupied by financial and thevestment concerns. The basement will have an up-to-the-minute resemble to the second and the mentions resembles.
