DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Stephen's Church is a rendition of the "carpenter Gothic" style. The several rooflines reveal various sections of the structure; narthex and nave under one, a smaller section to the rear for chancel, a chapel in the single transcept, and the L-shaped education wing. Although this latter section was added in 1961, its exterior features conform closely to those of the main church building. The structure is frame, on a brick foundation. The sanctuary measures 32' x 52, chancel 23' x 21'; the education wing is 53' along the west side of the church, 50' long in the other leg. The church is located on a corner near the business district, surrounded by small, residential structures.

Dominating the overall design is the board-and-batten siding with arched heads. This feature is found on the north elevation, the tower, and the west and south elevations of the education wing. Elsewhere, the siding ends squarely beneath narrow eaves, or below the cornice line. The Gothic theme is carried further in the pointed arches of the stained glass windows, door frames (with one, round-arched, exception) and louvred openings in the bell tower. Further decoration is provided by the short wall buttresses, and small brackets beneath the eaves on the east facade of the main block. Composition shingle is used on the roofs and on the four-sided spire of the square, two-level corner tower.

Alterations and additions took place in 1961. The narthex, which was originally a tower base on the northeast corner, was moved to the northwest corner, and a spire (part of the original design, but not included at first for lack of funds) and a second tower level added. The choir was slightly enlarged and the education wing erected on the west side.

Interior design and furnishings remain largely in their traditional state. Hammer beams provide interior support for the sanctuary; the arches formed by this structural feature are echoed in an arrangement of three, high, wide, pointed arches opening into the side chapel, chancel and side exit to the education wing. Walls are finished with wainscoting and plaster. Furnishings (alter, pews, choir stalls, stained glass) date from the early years of the church.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1871-4

St. Stephen's Episcopal Church is an excellent example of the relatively unusual "carpenter Gothic" style. This form is the expression, in wood, of the early Gothic Revival style, which empahsized the pointed arch, basilican plan, with steeple at the entrance end. Also noteworthy is the care with which the modern education wing reproduces design features of the church itself, thus blending with, rather than detracting from, the architectural integrity of the main structure, as many such additions do.

St. Stephen's begun in 1871 and completed in 1874, is the oldest church in Newton to be in continuous use by its congregation. It was built by Joseph Stevens, a native of England and carpenter by trade, who came to the U.S. in 1854. Stevens was assisted by another carpenter, David S. Stover, who came from Ohio to Newton in Both men found steady business in the growing town (incorporated 1857), 1858. as well as political activity: Stevens was an alderman, town mayor, and fire chief; Stover served on the city council.

The St. Stephen's Parish was first or ganized in 1867 by the Reverend W.T. Currie, and incorporated the following year. Although only five people are listed (with six others listed as "incorporators) as first members, by 1878 the church had 30 communicants. For a period between 1878 and 1911, however, membership was too small to maintain a resident minister, and services were discontinued during that time. Since then, however, St. Stephen's has enjoyed a renasence, as expressed in the new education wing and careful maintenance of the property.
