

### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Samuel Shephard Lines House is a one story, wooden Plantation Plain style or Low Country style raised cottage. It has a large front porch, a large side porch, and a kitchen porch. Four original chimneys remain. The house is weatherboarded and features simple gables and a metal roof. The weatherboard is placed over a handcut, wooden pegged frame. The chimneys are of hand-made brick, and the house rest on hand-made brick foundation piers and cedar tree trunks. There is "dragon tooth" trim around the top of the front porch, and louvered shutters are on all windows, some of which contain original glass. The front door has original sidelights. The porch has hand-made railings and square wooden columns. The interior is arranged on the four room, central hall plan. The central hall connects the front and rear porches. On the left are a horizontally paneled parlor and a bedroom; on the right, two bedrooms. The right rear extension includes a dining room and a kitchen. All rooms have a fireplace except the kitchen. The interior floors, walls, and ceilings are all pine paneling, left natural in two rooms and painted in the others. The four original mantels are handmade from heart pine. All rooms, except the kitchen, have chair rails and wainscoting. The original door hardware remains as well. The nominated area consists of just the house lot, approximately 150' by 200', which includes, besides the main house, the original detached kitchen, a new well and well-house, a capped shallow well, a historic dairy shed, and the original site of a schoolhouse. There is also an ornamented fence at the west end of the property. The grounds within the house lot include cedars and magnolias planted around 1860, fruit trees, and a grape arbor, all variously arranged in the level yard. Changes to the house include the addition of the kitchen around 1900 and the conversion of the original detached kitchen into a smokehouse. A bathroom was added at the rear of the central hall in 1948 but was later removed. In 1981 a bathroom was built within a bedroom.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Samuel Shephard Lines House is significant in architecture, landscape architecture, education, and military history. Architecturally, the house is significant as a good example of a Plantation Plain or Low Country Style raised cottage built in the late antebellum period. It features a broad front porch and wide central hall, and is raised about six feet from the ground. All of these features aided in the house's ventilation and thus its liveability. In keeping with the style, it is almost devoid of ornamentation but does contain locally produced materials such as heart pine floors, hand-hewn timbers, handmade brick piers and chimneys, plain pine chair rails and wainscoting, and original mantels. In terms of landscape architecture the house is significant because it retains some of the original mid-19th century plantings, such as cedar and magnolia trees, that were traditionally used around plantation dwellings. The fruit trees and grape arbor that remain on the house lot reflect the self-sufficient plantation that was once run from this house. The landscaping has remained intact primarily because the house has remained in the same family. In educational history the house is significant because a local, public school was opened on the property at the end of the 19th century. The one room, wooden structure, now gone, was located in the front yard of the house lot, fronting the public road. The owner's wife, Mrs. Nannie Brown Lines, taught all eleven grades for over 35 years. Her pupils came to this, the first public school in the northern end of Screven County, from that part of the county above Brier Creek. Before the passage of statewide education laws, schools like this were the only way rural families could have their children educated without sending them to private schools, which few could afford. In military history the house is significant as a documented example of one of the many houses where Union Troops on General William T. Sherman's infamous "March to the Sea" actually stayed overnight. Although many homes are said to have been occupied, the diary of General Sherman states that Union General Jefferson C. Davis, commander of the 14th Army Corps, stayed here December 4-5, 1864, while his troops foraged for supplies and even ransacked the house. Samuel Shephard Lines (1827-1916) moved here from coastal Georgia and built this house c. 1857-60. It was from here that he managed a 1500 acre self-sufficient plantation. His widow, Nannie Brown Lines, remained here until her death in 1936. The house has remained in the family to the present.

These areas of significance support property eligibility under National Register criteria A and C.




