Representation in Existing Surveys Inventory of Historic Places in South Carolina

Description The W.Q.M. Berly House, which was constructed in 1904, is a one-story, frame cottage with an irregular plan and a gable roof. The house is sheathed in weatherboard; the roof is covered with standing-seam metal. The facade features a cross gable with imbricated shingles and a sawn bargeboard, and a hip-roofed wraparound porch supported by turned posts with sawn brackets and a turned balustrade. The stained glass and incised wood center door, which is framed by transom and sidelights, is flanked by full-length, six-pane windows.

Significance One of the few remaining Victorian cottages in town, the W.Q.M. Berly House is an example of a town farmhouse. It is believed to have been built in 1904 by Charles Wallace Harmon for W.Q.M. Berly (1844-1915), who farmed lands on the Saluda River near this house. He acquired the property in 1904.<sup>74</sup> Upon his death in 1915, the property was inherited by his daughter Mrs. Bessie Kyzer, who died in 1963. The home is now occupied by her four daughters.
