Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Alfred H. Bordelon House (c,1872) is a frame, one-and-a-half story, transitional Greek Revival-Italianate-Stick Style galleried cottage located in the old residential area of Marksville. Despite some alterations, the house retains its National Register eligibility.

The house has a hall-less plan three rooms wide and two rooms deep with a five bay facade and a central entrance. The front center room contains a staircase which leads to the capacious finished attic. The front rooms connect with the gallery by means of floor-length sliphead windows,

The front gallery has square posts with molded capitals and the suggestion of an entablature. Between the posts are elaborately turned balustrades, The gable ends of the house are treated with decoratively cut Stick Style vergeboards. The facade is sheathed in flush boards and features plain detailing.

The two matching manuels are essentially in the Greek Revival aedicule style, but they also feature two Italianate touches: (1) The moldings are fairly elaborate. (2) The bottoms of the entablatures are partially arched,

Another Italianate feature is the decoratively painted ceiling in the front parlor. Consisting of a central medallion and a Baroque surround, the ceiling has a very personal and religious character with stylized clouds and headless birds. The original ceiling was painted over in the 1920's and was recently reproduced in a different color. Of course, significance in the area of art is not being claimed for the present reproduction. The only other noteworthy interior feature is a pair of original glass doors which connect the dining room with the rear parlor,

Major Alterations:

- 1. In the 1920's a porch was added which wrapped around the southeast corner of the house. This has since been enclosed.
- 2. In 1937 a second porch was added at the rear in the northeast corner. It was glazed in in 1947.
- 3. More recently a two story kitchen wing was added in the center of the rear. This wing is not visible from the front of the house despite its size.

Minor alterations include the widening of an interior doorway in the 1920's and the removal of interior shutters.

Assessment of Integrity

Despite these alterations, the house retains its original frontal appearance as well as its significant interior features (i.e., its mantels). In addition, the accretions are set to the rear; so the original part of the house still dominates the scene.

A modern carport and shed are also located on the property. They, of course, are listed as non-contributing elements.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criterion C

The Alfred H. Bordelon House is architecturally significant on the local level as the finest of the earliest surviving structures in Marksville and the immediate vicinity.

The City of Marksville has served as seat for the large rural parish of Avoyelles since its founding in 1809, Presently it has a population of approximately 5,100. The City and immediate vicinity were surveyed in 1980, at which time 176 fifty plus year old buildings were identified. This was before historical surveys were required to be comprehensive, so one could probably legitimately double that figure. The survey revealed that very little survives of Marksville's pre-Queen Anne Revival architectural heritage, despite the City's age. The overwhelming majority of the older residences are innocuous frame cabins, Queen Anne Revival cottages, pedestrian bungalows, or Colonial Revival cottages, Earlier periods of taste are all but unrepresented, For example, nothing at all is left from the Federal period. Indeed, the earliest architectural period from which anything survives at all in Marksville is the Greek Revival. The survey revealed that the area retains three Greek Revival structures, all of which are galleried cottages. Of these, the Bordelon House is certainly the most architecturally important. It is the largest, being the only one with a full five bay facade. Secondly, it is the most intact, being the only one, for example, which retains its original columns.
