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
Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Young-Bradfield House is a two-story Italianate townhouse located in an urban neighborhood near the business district of Vicksburg, Mississippi. Its three-bay, side-hall plan provides for double parlors and an entrance passage on the first floor and for three bed chambers and a passage above. Service areas are located in a small two-story wing and gallery attached to the rear elevation. Most architectural elements are reserved to the facade where a veneer of machine cut brick masks the less elegant seven course common bond structural wall. A single-leaf entrance door, surrounded by sidelights and a transom, is contained in a pilastered frontispiece with paired brackets supporting an overhanging cornice. A similar doorway above and the floor-length two-over-four windows were designed to give access to a double gallery that was never constructed. Undoubtedly, it would have enhanced the Italianate characteristics of the design which now are confined to the frontispieces, the prominent segmented window arches and the modest bracketed cornice.

Major elements of the interior design, which enjoys considerable integrity, include: iron and wooden chimney pieces in the Gothic and Rococo Revival styles; finely executed plaster cornices and centerpieces; a single run staircase with octagonal newel, vase-and-shaft ballusters and scrolled step-ends; and large window and door architraves finished with bulbous backbands. Most of the wooden floors and plaster walls are also original fabric.

There are no extant outbuildings associated with this property.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In the architectural history of Vicksburg, Mississippi, the Young-Bradfield House represents the construction activities which rebuilt that strategic city after its near destruction during the Civil War. The residential architecture of the period was largely expressed in a local interpretation of the Italianate style characterized by arched fenestrations, massive bracketed cornices and frontispieces, elaborate interior plasterwork and robust woodwork. The nominated residence is amoung the most complete essays in this style and one of the few surviving examples based on the side hall plan. In addition, few contemporary buildings enjoy the high degree of structural and architectural integrity as the Young-Bradfield House. With only minor exception, such as interior paint colors, the house stands as originally built.

In 1872, Lucy Mitchell paid \$10,000 for the west half of lot 239 in square 39. The property included the Vick-Lane House and enough land on either side to accomodate building lots. In November, 1872, Mitchell sold the eastern portion to Judge Upton M. Young who began construction of the nominated residence shortly thereafter (Warren Co., Miss., Deed Book MM: 305; 522). Young, a locally prominent attorney, was elected Circuit Judge in 1876 and again in 1880 (Goodspeed, II: 33). By 1895, Young had returned to his native Missouri to practice law in St. Louis (Chapman. p. 90). The nominated property was acquired by the Bradfield family who resided there until the 1970's. In 1980, the present owners purchased the Young-Bradfield House and are currently undertaking a thoughtful restoration program.
