Description

The Pecos River Bridge at Terrero, now serving as a pedestrian and equestrian bridge situated just to the west of the Pecos River bridge on NM 63 that replaced it, is a one-span timber bridge constructed by the U. S. Forest Service in 1921. The substructure consists of two concrete abutments and one timber pier which has recently been added to support the span. The deck of the bridge rests approximately six feet above the waterway.

The bridge employs a Howe through truss design with five panels of 15 feet each and with 1.75" steel rods used for the vertical members. The diagonal members are 10"x10" timbers. The total length of the span is 75 feet, and the roadway is 15 feet wide. The deck consists of 4"x4" timber topped with an asphalt surface and rests on timber stringers and crossbeams. Timber felloes flank the deck, and wood rails are bolted to the wood members of the truss. In 1944, as part of an effort to rehabilitate rotted elements, salvaged steel rails replaced the lower chords and salvaged steel hangers from old bridges replaced the original vertical members. Short sections of steel rails were also bolted to the concrete abutments as bridge shoes to reinforce the end posts.

Set in a high mountain canyon adjacent to the former mining district of Terrero and preserved by NMSHTD, the bridge conveys a strong feeling of an early Forest Service bridge project and, with the exception of the innovative restoration work completed in 1944, retains a high degree of integrity of setting, design, materials, workmanship.

#### Statement of Significance

Preserved and maintained by NMSHTD, the Pecos River Bridge at Terrero is historically significant for its long association with highway transportation in New Mexico dating to the first years of statehood when the federal government constructed many bridges located on federal lands that then became part of the state's federal or state highway system. The only Howe through truss design bridge remaining in New Mexico and one of the highest rated bridges in the bridge survey of 1987, the structure United States Department of the Interior National Park Service

is also significant for the ways in which it embodies the design, materials and methods of construction associated with that subtype of bridge.

Located along the narrow canyon carved by the Pecos River as it rushes out of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, the Pecos River Bridge at Terrero was one of four Howe through truss timber bridges undertaken along the upper portion of the river by the U.S. Forest Service in the early 1920s. By the late 1920s, the forest road had become NM 63 and served the Terrero mining district as well as increasing numbers of visitors seeking recreational opportunities in the upper Pecos country. Included in the highway department's maintenance control program, the timber bridges along NM 63 exhibited deterioration in the early 1940s, and most were eventually replaced. The bridge at Terrero, however, was refurbished in 1944 through an innovative program designed to make use of salvage materials as the country turned most of its building materials to the war effort. Salvage steel from railroad tracks and old bridges was substituted for many of the rotted timber members of the bridge, permitting the bridge to carry highway traffic until 1980s when a new bridge was constructed nearby. The original bridge was preserved.

The Howe through truss timber bridge design was employed in several bridge projects along the upper Rio Grande around the turn of the century. Its reliance on timber members made it ideal for the timber-rich regions of the state, and the iron rods which served as the vertical members supporting the deck and acting in tension required less costly shipping than did members of bridges fabricated exclusively of steel. The timber members also contributed to the rustic appearance of the bridge, an aesthetic consistent with much of the Forest Service's construction practices during the 1920s and 1930s.
