DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Frank L. Chenoweth house was completed in 1889 and still retains essentially the same form. The only modification to the exterior is the substitution of flat lintels for the original window arches in some of the windows, due to structural imperfections in those arches. The exterior of the building has been carefully maintained throughout the life of the building.

The house is a two-and-one-half story wood frame structure surfaced with brick veneer through the second story. Above the brickwork is a continuous decorative wood frieze which is capped by numerous steeply sloped roofs and decorative gables. On the north is a two story bay with bracketed overhanging pediment and a similar but medieval treatment is given the gable above the two story bay at the west side. At the northwest corner of the house stands an octagonal tower with an open third story and a dormered spire. Above the center of the building rises a lantern with a hipped roof. On the east side, a crowned chimney rises over the roof.

The complex massing of the Queen Anne style is heightened by a veranda which wraps around the house at the base of the tower and ends at a pediment over the entrance. A similar veranda serves a rear door and continues the lines of the first.

While several minor changes in the floor plan have been made over the life of the building, the interior of the house is being restored to its original configuration by its present owners. The interior remains in excellent condition and is richly detailed. The main rooms on the first floor have cornices molded into floral designs and the third floor has a large ballroom-studio which is well lit by the large windows of the lantern.

At the southeast rear portion of the property is a coach house which is nearly octagonal in form. While the original turntable floor was replaced with concrete to accommodate automobiles, the exterior retains its original appearance with its two "bull's-eye" windows and its broad, gabled roof.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

With its irregularity of massing and its variety of surface textures, the Chenoweth house is one of the finest designs in the vernacular Queen Anne style in Wisconsin.

Many factors are present which reflect the style. The steeply pitched gabled roofs with their many intersections have a variety of surface treatments in their gables such as the typically Queen Anne "sunrise" designs which appear frequently on the pediments. The polygonal bay windows, typical of this style, are capped with rectangular bays. The tower is an example of Queen Anne styling with its frequent openings, its lofty spire, and its variety of surface treatments and decorative elements.

Overall, the many and varied decorative elements are simple in effect and rather small in scale, in keeping with the Queen Anne tradition. This is evident in the veranda with its wide arched spandrels with incised carving under spindled soffits, its denticulated cornice, and its decorative balustrade. Further evidence of the variety and subtlety of decoration may be found in the classical articulated cornices, the stained glass borders of many of the windows, the decorative frieze, the dentils at the roof lines of the tower and the lantern, the corbelled chimney, the recticulation in the top of the west gable, and the latticework in the open tower.

Presently, the house remains in excellent condition and still retains the olive green color of the exterior woodwork which, along with the red brick, were favorite colors of the Queen Anne designers.

Frank L. Chenoweth was the son of Benjamin Chenoweth, a pioneer merchant in Monroe, Wisconsin and a wealthy town benefactor. Frank Chenoweth became quite wealthy in his own right as a town merchant. As a result, no expense was spared in the construction of his new home which was to become one of the most prominent social gathering locations in Monroe.
