The Fort Harker guardhouse, a substantial two-story native brown sandstone building, is situated at what was the west end of the parade ground. The stones, which measure as much as 36 inches long, 12 inches high, and 12 inches thick, are laid in a regular horizontal coursing. The building has a hipped roof extending over a two-story porch on the east side. The upper floor was originally divided into two large rooms and six small cells. This floor, which can be reached only by an outside stairway, has six windows, three in front and three in the rear. The lower floor was divided into three rooms: a guardroom, 26 by 15 feet; a non-commissioned officers' room, half that size; and a small tool room. The guardroom has three windows. There are no windows on either the north or the south side of the quardhouse.

Today it looks much as it did orginally--the cells are gone from upstairs and one partition downstairs has been removed. Bars on the upstairs windows are said to be original.

The building is now operated as a museum by the Ellsworth County Historical Society.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

Fort Harker was one of three forts (Harker, Hays, and Wallace) established along the Smoky Hill valley to guard the route to Denver, which passed through the part of Kansas most susceptible to Indian raids.

Fort Harker was originally established in the summer of 1864 as Fort Ellsworth. In November, 1866, the name was changed to Harker, and in January, 1867, it was relocated about three-fourths mile east.

For a time Harker was the headquarters of the district of the Upper Arkansas and the supply depot for all military forts west, including Colorado, New Mexico, and portions of Arizona.

It was at Harker in the fall of 1868 that Gen. Phil Sheridan planned his winter campaign of 1868-1869 which finally subdued the southern Indians.

In 1873 the military abandoned the fort; the railroad had put an end it its usefulness. The military reservation was opened to settlement and the buildings were sold.

The present town of Kanopolis is situated on the old fort site, and the guardhouse was for a time the Kanopolis city hall. It is the only surviving original building which has not been greatly altered. (Some officers' quarters stand two blocks east of the old guardhouse, but they have been altered into residential buildings.)


