

18. Description Ashbourne is a two-story brick structure with a five-bay facade, low gable roof, and a central cross gable. There is a brick cornice, segmental window arches on the first story, and jack arches on the second story. The entry has sidelights with panels below. Windows were most likely lengthened, possibly when the front gable was added. The paired windows on the second story are probably a later modification. (see next page)																												
19. History The house is believed to have been built by Joseph Barbaroux who bought the property in 1829. However, the structure could have been on the site before 1829. Barbaroux sold the land (then 112 acres) in 1844 as a result of financial difficulties and the deed refers to a steam mill and distillery on the property, possibly established by Barbaroux. 20. Significance Ashbourne is significant as an example of the evolution of architectural forms in rural Jefferson County. Originally a vernacular, Federal-style I-house, the structure was "modernized," probably in the middle of the 1800s, by the addition of a front, cross gable and lengthened windows - features which were (see next page)

In 1934 the house was purchased by Owsley Brown, president of the Brown-Forman Distillery Company of Louisville which had been founded by his father in 1870. The house is still owned by the Brown family.

Boundary Description

The boundary of the Ashbourne site is shown as a red line on the attached aerial photo. (SCALE: 1" = 200') The nominated site contains approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ acre and includes only the house. There are no outbuildings.
