Describe present and historic physical appearance.

DESCRIPTION

This picnic shelter is one of two that were constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in 1940 at Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Area. This shelter is small and can facilitate a large family or 2 small groups. Built in the rustic style, this shelter faces east and is situated on a hill slope on a trail to Sitting Bull Falls. It overlooks Sitting Bull Canyon and a CCC built dam. This one story, square shelter measures 26' x 19'. It is open on the north and east sides, and is against a hill slope on the south and west sides. Three concrete steps lead into the east side of the shelter.

The shelter has a stone foundation. The original floor was flagstone, but this was covered with concrete, possibly in the 1960s. This alteration is not noticeable from the exterior of the shelter and does not mar its appearance.

The shed roof is supported by four masonry piers that were constructed with square limestone and sandstone blocks, collected in Last Chance Canyon. The stones have a natural finish. The roof is constructed of Ponderosa pine log beams covered with 1" x 6" rough sawn boards, 1" x 2" edge metal, 30 lb felt, and asphalt roofing, which was laid with a 6" overlap and was sealed with roofing tar. In May 1992, the shelter was partially restored and rehabilitated during a historic preservation field school. Lincoln National Forest employees worked with six historic preservationists from Mary Washington College, Fredericksburg, VA, to restore the shelter roof and remove graffiti in the shelter. These restorations match the original appearance of the shelter, and thus, had no adverse effect on the structure.

Originally, the roof of the picnic shelter was constructed of log vigas, sheathing boards, and rolled asphalt. This roof had been covered with three inches of poured cement at an unknown later date. The field school and the Lincoln National Forest employees removed the roof, and replaced the rotten vigas, sheathing boards and rolled asphalt in their restoration of the shelter.

The shelter contains two painted stone and cement picnic tables, and has two small cement benches along the interior of the west wall.

The graffiti removal was undertaken with solvents, such as acetone, paint thinner, and Graffiti Remover, that did not harm the rock. The picnic tables and benches in the shelter were painted tan to cover graffiti and complement the rock material.

The above undertaking was submitted to the New Mexico State Historic Preservation Office and the modifications were considered to have no adverse effect on the shelter. It was repaired and restored to its original appearance.

Natural Setting

Sitting Bull Falls is located on the eastern edge of the Guadalupe Ranger District, 42 miles northwest of Carlsbad, at the end of Forest Road 137. The picnic shelter presented for nomination is located within Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Area in Sitting Bull Canyon on a bench to the north of Sitting Bull Falls at an elevation of 4660'. The canyon is a combination of rock cliffs and slopes over 50%. This area is very rocky and limestone and sandstone outcrops are abundant. The vegetation is predominantly scrub oak, Texas Madrone, agave, ocatillo, and prickly pear. A 150' high limestone cliff supports the water fall, and a variety of mosses and ferns grow in the immediate area. There are many natural pools above and below the falls.

History of the Surrounding Area

Sitting Bull Falls was originally part of a large ranch owned by Albert Knott from the early 1900s to 1924. At that time, the area was isolated and had a very natural setting. The Forest Service purchased Sitting Bull Falls in the mid-1920s, and by 1931 visitors could reach the falls by hiking one mile from a graded Forest Service road.

Sitting Bull Falls was a very unique and popular recreation site. Visitors traveled long distances to see Sitting Bull Falls, to swim in the pools and to hike in the canyon. In order to accommodate increased visitor attendance, Forest Road 137 was constructed in the mid 1930s, which led to a parking area to the north of the falls.

The popularity of the site made Sitting Bull Falls a logical choice for development by the CCC. Work began in the late 1930s at Sitting Bull Falls, and the main goal of the CCC was to retain the natural environment and to build structures that fit into the setting. Three shelters, a restroom, and dam were constructed on a bench to the north of the falls and were in the rustic style with rough cut limestone and sandstone from Last Chance Canyon and log beam roofs. The grand opening of the facility was in 1940. The recreation area has continued to be a popular tourist location and to maintain its historic integrity, it has been recorded as site AR-03-08-03-417, by the Lincoln National Forest.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Statement of Significance

The picnic shelter at Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Area is eligible for the National Register under criteria A and C as described in 36 CFR 60.4. This was a Civilian Conservation Corps facility built in 1940 by members from Camp F-37-N. CCC projects such as this one were important to the revitalization of the national economy during the Depression. As specified in National Register criteria, this structure possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. The picnic shelter represents an important historic resource, one that is not only associated with significant events in American History, but also one that embodies distinctive characteristics of CCC workmanship and architectural design.

CCC architecture was unique, especially the rustic style which is embodied in the shelters. This structure fits very well into the surrounding environment and is very plain in plan and design. Furthermore, stones from Last Chance Canyon were utilized in the shelter construction. This shelter is one of two of the best examples of the rustic style on the forest.

The structure is a product of an important government program that aided social welfare. The CCC employed many young men who were jobless, helping individuals and communities as a whole. It gave young men a sense of accomplishment, and the workmanship of CCC structures is notable. The Sitting Bull Falls picnic shelter is a representation of such workmanship, and its present condition is extraordinary considering its age.

The May 1992 Challenge Cost Share Field school rehabilitated and partially restored the picnic shelter. The restoration had a beneficial effect on the shelter and returned it to its original appearance.

The changes made to the Sitting Bull Falls Recreation Facility since the 1930s have not destroyed its integrity. There are few historical sites on the Guadalupe Ranger District, and fewer CCC structures remaining both on the Guadalupe district and on the forest as a whole. This makes the picnic shelter at Sitting Bull Falls an important historic site as well as an example of CCC work on the Lincoln National Forest.
