Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Palmer Hall constructed in 1904, is located on the eastern portion of the Colorado College campus, and dominates the north edge of a large open square. The building was designed by Andrews, Jacques, and Rantoul of Boston in the Romanesque Revival style. It is a massive 2-story rectangular building with raised basement, 278 feet in width and 90 feet deep. The material is rock-faced peachblow sandstone, random ashlar coursed, with trim of dressed sandstone. The sandstone was from quarries on the Frying Pan River near Aspen, Colorado.

The 2-story structure on a a high basement, is a symmetrically designed 5-part composition with a steeply pitched hipped roof of slate and a prominent central entrance. The roof, widely overhanging exposed rafter tips at the eaves, has a high central section, lower wings, and shallow hips over projecting end pavilions. Pairs of wide chimneys with corbeled caps project above the ridges of the wings. At the south entrance, the roof eave gently curves up and supports a large half hipped dormer with five lineal windows.

The projecting end pavilions, at the facade, contain three bays. Segmentally arched basement windows with voussoirs extend to a continuous, but flush, water table course of contrasting stone texture. Double hung sash fill the window openings typically with deep beveled reveals at the first floor and champhered jambs at the second floor. Spandrels are emphasized with a projecting stone panel between the first and second floor windows. Sills and flat lintels are rock faced and blend into the ashlar masonry.

Flanking the central entrance are three-bay ranges with pairs of openings with a center stone mullion at the first and second floor, above large segmentally arched openings at the basement. A projecting panel is set within the spandrel above and below each mullion.

The central entrance is the most distinguishing feature of the building. Three round arches spring from square columns and pilasters, with moulded capitals, set at the half level of the high basement. The arcade screens an entrance loggia opening to three fanlighted, double leaf doorways. The voussoir architrave courses of the arches are received on impost blocks set on the water table course of the foundation. Above the arcade, corresponding to the spandrel height, is a wide band inscribed, YE SHALL KNOW THE TRUTH AND THE TRUTH SHALL MAKE YOU FREE. The inscription forms the sill below a band of three pairs of window openings each having small colonette as jambs. Center mullions are paired colonettes.

Completing the entrance composition are flanking half round towers extending to the main eave and capped with flared conical roofs. Colonette jambs extend from the first floor opening sills to second floor head of the three window bays of each tower. The recessed spandrels have a projecting panel.

Five bay side elevations typically are set with paired window openings with deep beveled and champhered, at the second floor reveals. The west central entrance has a half hipped roof below a pair of long narrow window openings lighting the stair landing. The central east entrance pierces the foundation.

The rear elevation is characterized by the large central section projecting above the

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main eave of the end pavillion and the flanking, one-bay ranges. At the second floor of the central section the paired window openings rise into semicircular arched openings set above sill panels. Roundels are set at the ends carrying the rhythm of the arched openings. Basement windows at the center are triple openings and flat headed. Those basement openings of the pavillion and ranges are typically segmentally arched.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Promoter Ton Control

Palmer Hall is significant as one of the important buildings on the Colorado College campus symbolizing the founding of the college and its early development and as the finest remaining example of Romanesque Revival architecture in Colorado Springs. The building, designed by the nationally recognized architectural firm of Andrews, Jacques, and Rantoul of Boston in 1901, is the only survivor of four similarly designed buildings originally on the campus.

Palmer Hall, named in honor of General William Jackson Palmer, the founder of Colorado Springs, was sited on the campus to specifically block the northward extension of Tejon Street and the street car line. Thus the building reflects the influence of the college on the growth of Colorado Springs.

Originally built as a science building to house laboratories for chemistry, physics, and biology, it marked substantial curricular changes at the college at the time of its construction (1904). A college of engineering was established, providing degree programs in electrical, mining and civil engineering. Those changes and others transformed the local college into a nationally recognized educational center.

Using the basement laboratories in Palmer Hall, Gerald B. Webb, a faculty member, made significant discoveries regarding the treatment of tuberculosis in the 1920s. Webb founded the Colorado Foundation of Research in Tuberculosis.
