



#### Description

The Early Settlers Meeting House is a mid 19th century vernacular wooden church that stands at Leighton's Corner, at the west corner of the intersection of Foggs Ridge Road and Granite Road. The one and a half story, gable roofed building is set with its northeast gable end facing Granite Road. Because of the slope of the land to the southwest, the basement is exposed on the southwest (rear) gable end, to a lesser extent, on the northwest side. On these two facades, the basement level is clapboarded with cornerboards above a fieldstone foundation, and below the sillboard that marks the base of the main level. The southeast facade has a cut granite The main level and the upper block foundation. clapboarded and trimmed by sillboards with watertables, wide cornerboards, and a box cornice with mouldings, deep frieze, and The gable roof is covered with corrugated metal. returns.

The main facade, the northeast gable end, is covered by a wide board floored platform on a cut granite block foundation, which is as wide as the building. The main facade contains two entries, each a four panel door with four pane transom window, topped by a slightly peaked lintel with an upper moulding. A similar peaked lintel with an upper moulding is found on the 12/8 sash window in the gable. A painted wooden wall sign to the east of the east entry identifies the building. The northwest and southeast lateral facades each have three 12/8 sash windows, whose plain frames butt up against the frieze of the cornice. The rear southwest gable end has a plain framed beaded board door in its basement level, and two 12/8 sash windows with drip mouldings on their lintels, in the main level.

Earlier Appearance:

Originally, the building had a fieldstone foundation, a very low pitched roof, a central entry and two windows in the southeast facade (facing Foggs Ridge Road), two windows in each gable end, and three windows in the northwest lateral facade. The interior was filled by box pews and a pulpit against the northwest wall. In 1856, the church split into liberal and conservative factions. The more liberal group of Free Will Baptists built their own church, the First Free Will Baptist Church of Ossipee, Wakefield and Effingham. The more conservative group, known as Bullockites, remained in the old building, which was then in need of repair. Not to be upstaged by their rivals, the Bullockites remodeled the old meetinghouse in 1856. The value of the pews in the old building was appraised at \$100; and the pewowners were apparently bought out at that price. The remodeling including a new interior with new pews and pulpit in a new arrangement. The entry in the southeast wall was replaced by a window. And two new entries replaced the window in the northeast gable end, which became the main facade. A higher, steeper roof, a granite block foundation, and new window sash were installed. The carpentry by Jeremiah Leavitt cost about \$160. The work began in April and was completed in September, when the church was dedicated. The pews were resold to pay for the renovation.

#### Statement of Significance

The Early Settlers Meeting House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for architecture. It possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association for the period 1856 when the building was rebuilt. It is a well-preserved example of mid-19th century vernacular church. This building type is characterized by its one-story gable-roofed form with gable-front orientation; two entries on the front facade, and three-bay depth. The presence of three other churches in this form in Ossipee attests to it popularity.

The fall of 1806 saw the beginning of a revival that brought the Free Will Baptist denomination to Ossipee. The first baptisms into the new faith took place in the summer of 1807. And the first communion service was held in a barn near Leighton's Corner in June of 1809. The exact date of the organization of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Ossipee as a separate church is unclear, but it apparently took place some time between 1811 and 1816. The date of construction of the Free Will Baptist meetinghouse is also uncertain. It is known that Jacob Leighton gave the land for the meetinghouse, and that he and others donated labor and lumber for its construction. Dates as early as 1804 and as late as 1818 have given by different authors for the erection of the building. it is not likely that the building was standing in June 1809 when the Baptists conducted their service in a barn. And there is a strong tradition that the meetinghouse was standing in 1812.

#### Statement of Significance (continued)

The church began to decline after the 1880's and finally faded away. In July, 1928, the remaining church members deeded the building to the Ossipee Historical Society. There have been few changes since the 1856 remodeling. The roof has been sheathed with metal. And the front landing has been replaced, when necessary. But essentially, the building appears today as it did in 1856.

#### Verbal Boundary Description

#### Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the nominated property represent the original property upon which the building was constructed.
