

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Timothy A. Whiting House is located in Rochester's Central Park, at 225 First Avenue Northwest. Originally the house stood about three blocks away at 527 North Broadway, in the same Lower Town area of north Rochester. It was moved to a storage lot in 1971 to avoid demolition and then to its present site in 1972.

It is a two story, wood frame, side-hall Italianate house, almost square in plan, sheathed in white lap siding. The hipped roof has bracketed eves. One story hipped-roof bays and rooms project to the west, north, and south. A one story embellished porch extends across the east (front) side and there are small porches at the bay projections. Fenestration consists of four-over-four double-hung sash in rectangular openings with simple trim. There were minor alterations to the exterior during the moves. The restoration of the interior has utilized doors, floors, and hardware salvaged from three razed nineteenth century Rochester houses.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Whiting House is significant as a well-preserved representative example of residential Italianate architectural design which dates from Rochester's nineteenth century development as a center of agricultural commerce, before the twentieth century Mayo Clinic-related growth period. It was constructed for Timothy A. Whiting, prosperous Rochester grain merchant and owner of over 1,000 acres of cultivated land during the period when Olmsted County and southeast Minnesota was an important wheat-producing region. The Whiting House was moved three blocks in 1971-72 to avoid demolition; however, the house remains in the same north Rochester residential area traditionally known as Lower Town. Since the move the house has been restored and is presently maintained as a public historical museum.
