8. Significance (McCormick Hall)

McCormick Hall along with its sister structure, Ringland Hall, is a fine example of a building type closely associated with educational architecture during the late 19th century. Its basic form, consisting of a two or three story block with an entrance tower, could be seen in many communities as a high school or grammar school structure. Details varied, as some would be quite simple structures with no distinguishing architectural features while others, like McKinley High School in Lincoln, Nebr. (recorded by HABS in 1934-5), were more complex in form and quite lavish in architectural detail. McCormick and Ringland Halls are exceptional examples of the building type as well as being two of a very few, and perhaps only, remaining examples of the type in the state.
