DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

★ALTERED

Burbank Downtown Station is an eclectic Mediterranean-styled building containing elements of the Spanish Colonial Revival, the Mission Style, and the Pueblo Style. The front entrance is marked by an arcaded loggia, with an irregular, picturesque massing. The public lobby is decorated with two Treasury Department Section of Fine Arts murals, depicting elements of Burbank's economic base.

LOCAL CONTEXT

Burbank, named for Dr. David Burbank, a Los Angeles, dentist, was subdivided in 1887. The post office is at the southern end of the original commercial district. There are several new high rise structures in the area. The nearest cross street to the north, San Fernando Boulevard, has been converted to a pedestrian mall. There are no historic structures or districts located in the vicinity of the Downtown Station. In addition, no archaeologic or paleontologic sites are known to exist within or adjacent to the subject property.

PHYSCIAL APPEARANCE

The building appears to be in excellent structural condition and it, as well as the site, are well maintained. There have been no significant interior or exterior modifications. The building retains its original doors and fixtures.

The structure is a steel frame, reinforced poured concrete building. It has a Spanish tile roof. The entry porch and lobby flooring, as well as the lobby walk, are of dark brown tile. Decorative glazed tiles with romantic Spanish motifs form a band around the walls of the public lobby. The orginial skylight and wooden workroom floor are intact.

The design is a simplified, though highly romantic, rendition of the Spanish Colonial Revival Style (1915-1940). In terms of basic mass, portions of the front elevation, especially the rectangular "tower" south of the arcade, are reminiscent of the Pueblo Revival Style (1905-1940). The proportions of the front arcade are similar to those found in Mission Revival Style buildings (1890-1920). This apparent combination of styles is typical of such structures. Pueblo Revival/Mission Revival/Spanish Colonial Revival Styles appear to represent different aspects of a common aesthetic which freely draw from the various "type" features of each.

The Downtown Station is an extremely well proportioned structure which presents a unified, pleasing form from nearly every angle and elevation. The overall feeling is more of a very large residential structure, rather than a commercial building.

Distinctive exterior features include:

- An arched entry arcade with a tile floor and exposed beam ceiling;
- Recessed windows, some of which have wrought iron grates, others with rustice wooden shutters, and several behind heavy cast concrete;

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Though the Burbank Downtown Station is slightly less than 50 years old, the structure possesses exceptional significance which justifies its inclusion in the National Register. This exceptional significance is based on its high artistic values, its importance as a significant example of a major theme of Depression-era construction, as a product of one of the best known architects of the late thirties, and in its inclusion of a mural by Barse Miller, a noted "Project" artist.

ARCHITECTURE

The building is significant under National Register Criterion C as possessing high artistic values. Most smaller post offices relied on a standard, rigidly symmetrical plan, and simply applied pre-cast ornament to give the building its identity. This building, though conforming to the functional requirements of the Postal Service, exhibits the irregular volumes and asymmetricalplan typical of the Spanish Colonial and other Mediterranean Revival styles commonly employed in private projects. The side elevations, articulated with recessed windows and projecting volumes, are designed to present aesthetically pleasing views as one moves around the structure. The front elevation is also complex, and the arcaded entrance both relates to the street and screens the lobby from its heat and noise.

Many smaller post offices constructed in southern California in the mid-thirites were designed in some form of the Spanish Colonial/Mediterranean Revival. Most of these buildings have, however, been heavily modified, not uncommomly beyond recognition as Mediterranean buildings. The Burbank Downtown Station thus acquires significance beyond its own architecture as a rare example of a once-common building type. The small, utilitarian Spanish/Mediterranean post office is one of the central themes in this nomination, and the Burbank Office is a good example of this theme.

Gilbert Stanley Underwood was one of the most successful Los Angeles architects during the 1930s. He reveived numerous federal commissions for large projects, notably the Los Angeles Federal Building and Courthouse, and the Los Angeles Terminal Annex Post Office (also included in this nomination). Most of these projects are much larger than the Burbank building. The Burbank Post Office thus is an important example of this important architect's smaller buildings.

- A wrought iron balcony projecting from a second floor window on the front elevation;
- Wrought iron hanging light fixtures inside the entry arcade and flanking the main entrance:
- o Ornate Spanish Colonial wooden doors with painted highlights; and
- Canales.

Distinctive interior features include:

- Tile floors and walls with a band of decorative glazed tiles having romantic Spanish motifs;
- Original tin ceiling lights;
- Wrought iron brackets supporting tables attached to the walls;
- Exposed beam ceiling; and
- Ornate Spanish Colonial wooden doors.

ALTERATIONS

A new HVAC system has been installed, and a new bank of post office boxes has been added at the north end of the public lobby.

ART

The building also contains a mural, painted in 1940 by Barse Miller. A noted painter and educator, Miller was born in New York City on January 24, 1904. He studied at the National Academy of Design in New York City, and at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art with Henry Snell and Hugh Breckenridge. He received several federal commissions for murals during the 1930s and early forties, and his work is included in the permanent collection of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Museum of Modern Art in New York, and in the National Museum of Art in Glasgow, Scotland.

The murals depict two of the primary industries in Burbank, "Aviation" and "Motion Picture Filming". The Lockheed Aircraft Corporation and several film and television

studios are still located in Burbank. The iconology of the murals relates directly to their setting in Burbank, and derives most, if not all, of their meaning from that setting. Aesthetically, Miller dealt successfully with the problem of including a large number of figures in an easily readable space, and the two murals are among the more technically accomplished post office murals.

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
