## Narrative Description

The Brinks House is a modest wood-frame residence of vernacular design. The house has an irregular plan, composed of a 1 1/2-story gabled mass with a 1-story shed addition along the full width of the east side. The primary entrance is offset under the main gable, a 9-light panelled wooden door and a concrete stoop access the house. Windows are predominately 1-over-1 double hung units. A large fixed cottage window is placed adjacent to the front door. Bevelled clapboard siding clads the residence. Wooden shingles cover the roof of the main portion of the house, with rolled asphalt roofing on the shed-roofed addition. The house rests on a concrete foundation.

A wooden, shed-roofed garage sits to the east of the residence. It is also clad with clapboard, and includes double, wooden doors.

## Narrative Statement of Significance

The Brinks House dates to the settlement period in Alberton. It is a significant example of the vernacular gable-front house form which was common during the early railroading period of Alberton's development from 1908-1917. This residential form was favored by many working class homeowners due to the minimal expense and ease of construction. Today, the Brinks House is one of the very few remaining local examples of the form retaining primary integrity of design and materials. Reflecting patterns of residential construction and typical lifeways of the period, it is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places according to Criterion C.

The first name to appear on the ownership records of this and other parcels in Alberton is John McCarthy. The Polk City Directories for Missoula reveal that McCarthy worked as a representative of the Missoula-based Jovita Land Company in 1909, and as an independent real estate agent in 1911. McCarthy evidently purchased several Alberton lots on speculation. The original owners of this home were E.P. and Ella Brinks. E.P. Brinks was employed by the Milwaukee Road as a telegraph operator. Brinks purchased the water system of the Milwaukee Land Company and the privately developed springs of W.T. Adams, combining the two systems. He later sold the system to the town of Alberton, forming the town's primary water supply.

The architectural importance of the Brinks House is highlighted by the fact that dozens of houses of this type were constructed in Alberton during the prosperous days when the community was a railroading center, and this is the only one to retain a high level of design and material integrity. The simple gable-fronted, rectangular form is typical, as are the offset entryway, double-hung windows and clapboard siding.
